David William Whitmire, jr., 25, a resident of Timberville for the past 15 years, a veteran of the Korean War and husband of Mrs. Helen Pullins Whitmire, died at 4:45 Thursday morning at McGuire Veterans Hospital in Richmond.

MRS. LAWLER LEAVES MILLION TO CHARITY

Who was Mrs. Florence Hawkins Lawler? I propose to answer this question.

Mrs. Lawler was born at Timberville about 1886. Her mother was Ellen Strickler Hawkins. Her father was Richard Hawkins, a brother of Mr. William Hawkins who started the Hawkins Hardware Company about 1905, Main and Elizabeth Street in Harrisonburg. The Hawkins men that are in the store there now are grandsons of William Hawkins. Mrs. Lawler's mother was a daughter of Philip Strickler. Philip Strickler was my uncle, a brother to my father, B. Frank Strickler, of Timberville. B. F. Strickler built that brick house at the south end of the Timberville bridge. He built it in about 1868. He got out of the Civil War in 1865. He was married in 1871 and built the house before he was married.

In 1872 his first son, David C., was born. In 1884 his last son, S. Vernon, was born. There were seven sons all told. I was born in 1877. There were three older than I and three younger than I. My name is Robert Ed. Lee Strickler, after Gen. R. E. Lee. My father was a great admirer of Gen. Lee.

Mrs. Lawler was the youngest of three girls; the oldest, Lottie, the second one Mary (or Mollie), the third was Florence or Lizzie. I think it was Lizzie Florence. We called her Lizzie when she lived with us. When Florence was small her father died of typhoid fever. That was about 65 to 75 years ago. Typhoid was often bad in those days. Her mother, cousin Ellen, as we called her, had to go back to her father, Philip Strickler, with her three orphan girls. He lived near the Strickler Mill, later the Cold Storage Plant.

In the mean time, my father B. F. Strickler had sold his farm adjoining (uncle) Phil Strickler's farm. He bought a large farm of Lew Hinkle and had moved there near Endless Caverns. This was in 1884, when Grover Cleveland was first elected president. My father took sick soon after he moved to the new farm and mother was sick also. In 1885 my father moved again about one mile up Smith Creek on the old Strickler homestead. This farm is now known as the Trent Koontz farm, which was more of a grazing farm.

Mother was not strong in those days but she kept going. In 1893 she had a stroke and died suddenly.

It was a hard blow for us boys. There were seven boys and no girls. We needed a housekeeper. Cousin Ellen Hawkins was a widow with the three girls and no boys.

My older brother got her to come and live with us and make a home for herself and the three girls, as well as a home for us. These girls ranged from seven to about 11 years of age. We seven boys ranged from nine to 21. None was married. Cousin Ellen had a big family to cook for at first but we soon scattered. The oldest went away to boarding school at West Central Academy that same fall. Soon others were away at boarding school. One year, 1898, cousin Ellen Hawkins moved to West Central Academy with her three girls and our three younger boys, Fred, Harry and Vernon. They had rooms right in the school building. They got food from the farm and in that way they had all they needed and cost was light. Then later cousin Ellen kept house for a Mr. Pickering near Tenth Legion school, just a ½ mile for the girls to walk to school. Our two youngest boys were at Bridgewater College with me. I was firing two boilers at the College to earn my board. And the boys, Harry and Vernon, got some work.

In a few years the girls became telephone girls in Washington, D. C. Florence had business enough about her to run a moving picture show. In Washington, D. C., Florence met her husband, Mr. Lawler. He and two other men started the Union Life Insurance Company in Portsmouth, Va. They soon moved it to Richmond, Va. When Mr. Lawler got the Insurance Company well started, he died about 1929. But his partners had died also and he had bought up nearly all of the insurance company stock. He willed all the stock to his wife, Florence Hawkins Lawler. That was in 1929. Mr. Lawler was president of the company when he died.

Mrs. Lawler took up the management of the company after his death and she showed great business ability, becoming chairman of the board and treasurer of the company. She became the only woman as executive head of a legal reserve life insurance company in the U. S. At the time of her death she was owner of nearly all the stock in the company.

My wife and I attended the funeral in Richmond. We went with several other cousins. Her two nieces in Detroit flew down on Sunday prior to the funeral on Monday, February 26. She was found dead on February 23, 1962. She was 75 years old. Her husband was a Catholic and she had joined her church. A requiem mass was said at 10 a. m., Monday, February 26, in the large Cathedral of the Sacred Heart and enternment was in Mt. Calvary cemetery, on the banks of the James. I noticed several colored servants walked with the family.

My wife and I had visited her in Richmond when she lived in the

Tuckehoe Apartments and brother Vernon and I visited her in the home of her niece in West Richmond. About two years ago we spent the night with her when she was living in her nice pent house in the fine Wisconsin Apartment Hotel. We talked to a later hour about the time when were as one family. She never retired early.

Nine years ago we visited her sister Mary. Mary's husband was a large Canadian wheat farmer. She lived at Victoria, Canada. Victoria is the capital of British Columbia. Mary died soon after we saw her when she was in the hospital with a bad heart. Victoria had flowers on every lamp post. We had such a nice boat ride from Vancouver to Seattle, stopping one day at Victoria.

The Richmond Times-Dispatch of March 1, states that Mrs. Lawler at the time of her death was chairman and treasurer of the Union Life Insurance Company. She left the bulk of her multi-millionaire estate to charity.

Under the terms of her will, all her stock in the insurance company will go to the Florence H. Lawler Trust. The stock has a book value of \$5,000,000 but the sale of the stock will be much more.

The trust is a charitable fund, founded by Mrs. Lawler for the benefit of hospital, educational and mission work of the Richmond Diocese of the Roman Catholic church of which she was a member.

All together Mrs. Lawler's estate was valued for probate purposes at \$5,624,823, being the largest ever probated in South Richmond's clerk's office and among the largest in the city's history.

Mrs. Lawler left other charitable bequests and also bequests to relatives and friends among which were \$25,000 to each of the three nieces and one nephew. Also \$10,000 to a friend and cousin in Washington, Edith Garber Maceta.

Her almost priceless personal effects were left to friends.

The last word we got from Mrs. Lawler was this sympathy card on the sudden death of Dr. Vernon Strickler.

Dear Ed. and Wife:

I was shocked to hear of the death of Vernon. I offer my deepest sympathy. How many more of the boys are living? Do write to me. My best to you and your family.

Joseph K. Ruebush, Area Historian, Dies

July 26, 1963

Joseph K. Ruebush, 84, widely known book collector, publisher, and historian and an authority on the earlier days of Rockingham county and the Shenandoah Valley, died at Rockingham Memorial Hospital Thursday at 5:37 a.m.

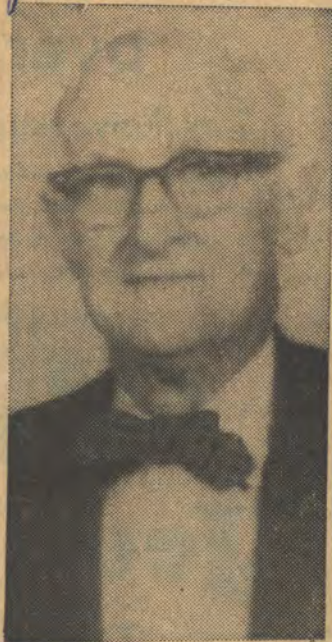
Mr. Ruebush, a lifelong resident of Dayton and Harrisonburg, had not been well for some time and had been a patient in the hospital since July 1.

He was one of the original trustees of the Rockingham Public Library and one of the founders of the Rockingham Historical Society of which he was senior honorary president. Mr. Ruebush was also active with the Civil War Centennial Commissions and the Shenandoah Valley Civil War Round Table.

Dr. Wayland Associate

Mr. Ruebush was a close friend and long-time associate of

the late distinguished Shenandoah Valley historian, Dr. John W. Wayland. Mr. Ruebush encouraged Dr. Wayland to write his "History of Rockingham County," which Mr. Ruebush published in 1912.

Mr. Ruebush was the sixth generation of his family, on his mother's side, to become associated with books. He was a great-grandson of Joseph Funk, noted music publisher of Singers Glen, and the publishing firm Mr. Ruebush inherited at Dayton was founded by Mr. Funk.

After retiring from the Ruebush-Kieffer Co. (now the Shenandoah Press) at Dayton, Mr. Ruebush devoted his entire time to book collecting and history. The collection in his Franklin street residence numbers over 4000 volumes.

He was an extensively engaged in acquiring rare books and manuscripts, especially Americana and Virginia. His book shop was visited by persons from all parts of the United States, many of them coming to Mr. Ruebush to trace their families who originated in the Shenandoah Valley. His collection of histories of the pre-colonial period in the United States is outstanding.

Began As Hobby

In an interview several years ago, Mr. Ruebush said he started collecting books as a hobby by buying from persons who had written family and local histories

that weren't in demand — and the hobby grew into a business. Some of these early volumes have become valuable. Many of the other books he owned were purchased at auction sales in New York. He formerly visited booksellers in Northern cities almost every year.

He was a recognized authority on the valuation of old and rare books, his catalogs, of which he had issued nearly 100, are being used as a guide to such values in many libraries across the nation.

Mr. Ruebush had visited nearly every historic spot in the Shenandoah Valley and nearby West Virginia. For years he devoted much of his time to visiting these places and he became an authority on the history of many of them.

Editor and Publisher

Mr. Ruebush, of German and French extraction, was a descendant of a long line of publishers, composers, poets and writers. He had a literary inheritance of over 200 years. He was not a writer himself but was the guiding hand behind many history and genealogy publications.

While associated with the Ruebush-Kieffer Co. at Dayton, he was literary editor of the magazine, "Musical Million," which his father, Ephriam Ruebush, and Poet Aldine Kieffer founded in 1869. He later edited the Rockingham Outlook, a weekly newspaper published at Dayton.

One of the outstanding books published by Mr. Ruebush was the monumental volume, Harrison's "Settlers of the Long Grey Trail," a history of the famed Harrison family which settled in the Shenandoah Valley. He also published histories of Pendleton and Alleghany counties, Strickler's Rockingham Marriages, Culpeper County Records, the Coffman Clan, a History of the United Brethren Church, and many others.

His "Scenic and Historical Guide to the Shenandoah Valley," published in 1923, was the first work of its kind in this part of Virginia.

Extensive Traveler

Mr. Ruebush was an extensive traveler in Europe and the United States and on those trips traced the history of his own family and many others.

Brought up among printers and publishers with traditions of corresponding activities handed down to him, Mr. Ruebush naturally found a congenial career among books and literary occupations.

was one of the founders of the Rockingham Dairy Herd Improvement Assn., which he saw grow from six members to several hundred. He also actively participated in the development of the Rockingham dairy industry which has become the largest in Virginia.

He was also one of the founders of the Valley of Virginia Milk Producers, and was a charter member of the Rockingham Cooperative Farm Bureau. Associates always considered Mr. Roller as a leader in advanced dairying and farm practices.

Mr. Roller devoted much of his time as a volunteer minister, and as an elder of the Church of the Brethren. He was charter member of the Fairview Church of the Brethren, near Endless Caverns where he preached for many years in the

Jennie Willis Atkinson Bradford, the eldest daughter of the late Dr. and Mrs. J. O. Atkinson, of Elon College, North Carolina, was indeed a daughter of Elon and the Church. Her father was a member of the College's original faculty, long-time trustee, and a brilliant spokesman for the College vocally and through THE CHRISTIAN SUN, which he edited for many years. Her Mother was a graduate of Elon in the Class of 1895.

Growing up in the shadow of Elon and in the home of dedicated Church parents, the life of Jennie Willis Atkinson Bradford was woven into the very being of Elon and the Church. She graduated from the College in 1917; she married Russell T. Bradford of the Class of 1916; a sister — Mary D. Atkinson McCardell, graduated in 1920, and her brother — J. O. Atkinson, Jr. — in the Class of 1925. She was elected a member of the College Board of Trustees in 1936, serving for 17 years, until her death on December 31, 1953. She was a faithful member of Berea Congregational Christian Church, Driver, Virginia, where her talents freely given in music and in many other ways made her life there a great blessing. She served as President of the Eastern Virginia Conference Women's Fellowship and was a leader in the Conference and



Southern Convention Women's Fellowship until her death.

The Board of Trustees of Elon College noted the passing of Mrs. Bradford in its

memoirs resolution:

"Mrs Bradford grew up at Elon College, in a home where loyalty and love for the Church of Christ and for Elon, its institution for Christian higher education, were a consuming passion. She accepted as a privilege membership and responsibility on the Board of Trustees. Not only were her counsels and judgments of incalculable value; the influence of her presence and radiant personality were an inspiration and a joy. The Board records its deep appreciation of the life and service of Mrs. Bradford." Upon her death, she was succeeded to membership on the Board of Trustees, by the Honorable Russell T. Bradford.

The establishment of the JENNIE WILLIS ATKINSON BRADFORD SCHOLARSHIP is a most worthy tribute to a good, a talented, and a devoted Christian woman. Elon College will administer this fund as a sacred trust and as a memorial to Mrs. Bradford.

REV. A. W. ANDES DIES EARLY TODAY

Widely Known Pastor of
Rockingham—Has Been
Sick Since December

The Rev. A. W. Andes, a minister of the Christian Church, and one of the most widely-known and beloved pastors in Rockingham county, died at his home at Park View this morning at two o'clock.

Although he had been in ill health for several months his condition was not considered serious until a week ago. He was a victim of anemia.

A son of Jacob A. and Barbara Andes, he was born near Mt. Clinton 55 years ago. His parents moved to Weyers Cave when he was a small boy and he spent most of his early years working on his father's farm there. He joined the Antioch Christian Church when a youth.

Rev. Mr. Andes was graduated from Elon College, North Carolina, in 1906. He chose the ministry for his vocation before graduating and began his first pastorate at Palmyra and Joppa, in Shenandoah county, in June 1906.

Since then he served 19 of the 21 churches in the Virginia Valley Central Christian Conference. He devoted his entire life to the ministry in this section, serving as many as eleven rural churches at one time. Having served his churches faithfully and being noted for his deep consecration, Rev. Mr. Andes will be missed from the work he loved so dearly.

Rev. Mr. Andes was a member of the Southern Christian Convention and also was a member of the General Mission Board of the Congregational-Christian church. He served a number of years as a trustee of Elon College.

For 25 years, he served as secretary of the Virginia Valley Central Christian Conference, never missing a session until last March when he was kept away by ill health.

On Dec. 26, 1912, Rev. Mr. Andes was united in marriage with Miss Minnie E. Bowman, of near Linville. Besides his wife and mother, he is survived by four sons, Rev. William J. Andes, Roy, Raymond and Mark Andes, all at home; and a daughter, Clarene, also at home. He also is survived by two brothers, Emmett W. Andes, of Intake, Montana, and Owen W. Lengthy Illness Claims Actress Ethel Waters

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Ethel Waters, an actress and singer who became the grand lady of gospel and blues, died at a friend's home Thursday after a lengthy illness. She was 80.

Miss Waters had suffered from high blood pressure, diabetes and a weak heart.

"Our loss is heaven's gain," said the Reverend Billy Graham, whose revival crusades often featured spirituals sung by Miss Waters. "She was a superstar, not only on stage and on the screen, but in her personal faith."

"I'm not afraid to die, honey," she told a reporter when she first became ill. "In fact, I'm kinda looking forward to it. I know that the Lord has his arms wrapped around this big, fat sparrow."

Born to a 13-year-old unwed mother in the bleak West End of Chester, Pa., a Philadelphia suburb, Miss Waters had a 50-year show business career — as a vaudeville singer, Broadway star, respected television and film actress, and gospel singer.

But most of all, she sang the blues.

Once she was asked who had taught her to sing, and her reply was: "Who ever teaches fish to swim and birds to fly. I can't ever remember having a lesson."

Miss Waters made classics of her songs, such smoky jazzblues numbers as "Am I Blue" and "Stormy Weather." The legendary jazz tune "Dinah" was a Waters intonation, made popular in her Broadway hit, "Plantation Revue of 1924."

At 17, she became the first woman to sing "St. Louis Blues" professionally. She made her way quickly to Broadway with the hit "Mama's Daughter" in 1939. She won the New York Drama Critics Award for Carson McCullar's "Pinky" in 1950.

Among her films were "Cabin in the Sky," "Pinky" and "Member of the Wedding." Miss Waters' powerful performance as adviser to a troubled Southern girl in "Member of the Wedding" won her a nomination for an Academy Award for best actress in 1952.

Her autobiography, "His Eye is on the Sparrow" was a bestseller in 1951.

In 1959, her career took a new direction. She attended a Billy Graham revival meeting and began a career as a gospel singer, joining his crusades and recording several gospel albums.

Miss Waters' three marriages ended in divorce, and she was plagued by bad investments and tax troubles. She made several fortunes, but spent her last years in near poverty. "She was struggling financially. She was living on Social Security," a friend said.

The Bill of Rights

Dear Heloise:

For those who have old paper and fabric covered lamp shades (with paper lining) may I suggest how I renovate all of our shades? I am in this business.

Dust the shade inside and out well with a brush.

Paint the inside of the shade with any paint which happens to be about the house. (Use a brush). One must use a black, dark gray, dark brown, or aluminum paint. I prefer aluminum but often use black. Let this dry overnight.

Now paint over the dark color on the inside of the shade with white or any pastel paint. I always use a non-shiny, flat paint. Amazingly enough, one coat invariably covers perfectly. Hang the shade with a string to thoroughly dry on the clothes line, etc.

The last operation. . . . Paint the outside of the shade with any color in the world! One coat of flat paint only. Then let hang to dry once again.

Results? New shades that can be sponged off when soiled.

If a contrasting trimming is desired buy some at a dime store. One-fourth inch velvet ribbon is very attractive on these shades. Stationery stores sell "paper" narrow banding in colors and metallics, so often found on new shades. If one is planning to use new trim on their shade. . . the old trim should be pulled off before painting. The new bindings may be applied with glue.

Reason for the dark colors on the inside:

If a dark color is not applied first you will have an unpleasant shade when lighted. Every brush stroke will show up.

After using the above method you will no longer have a translucent shade but an opaque one. Many of our finest new lamps are fitted with new opaque shades and given excellent lighting.

THE TEN ORIGINAL AMENDMENTS In Force

ARTICLE I. Religious Establishment, Press, and Right to Petition. Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or the right of the people to petition the Government for a redress of grievances.

ARTICLE II. Right to Keep and Bear Arms. A well regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed.

ARTICLE III. No Soldier To Be Quartered. No Soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house, without the consent of the owner; in time of war but in a manner to be prescribed by Law.

ARTICLE IV. Right of Search and Seizure. The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no Warrant shall issue, without a probable cause, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized.

ARTICLE V. Provisions Concerning Trial by Jury. No person shall be held to answer for a capital or other infamous crime, except in cases arising in the time of war or public danger; nor shall any person be put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall any person be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without just compensation, if private property be taken for public use.

ARTICLE VI. Right to Speedy Trial. In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the State and district wherein the crime shall have been previously committed, or in which the nature and cause of the accusation; to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to have compulsory process for witnesses, and to have the assistance of counsel for his defense.

ARTICLE VII. Right of Trial by Jury. In suits at common law, the value in controversy shall exceed five dollars; and in all such cases, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved, and no fact tried by a jury, shall be otherwise re-examined in any court of the United States, than on the common law.

ARTICLE VIII. Excessive Bail or Fines Prohibited. Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishments inflicted.

ARTICLE IX. Rule of Construction of Constitution. The enumeration in the Constitution of certain rights shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people.

ARTICLE X. Rights of States Under Constitution. The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people.
