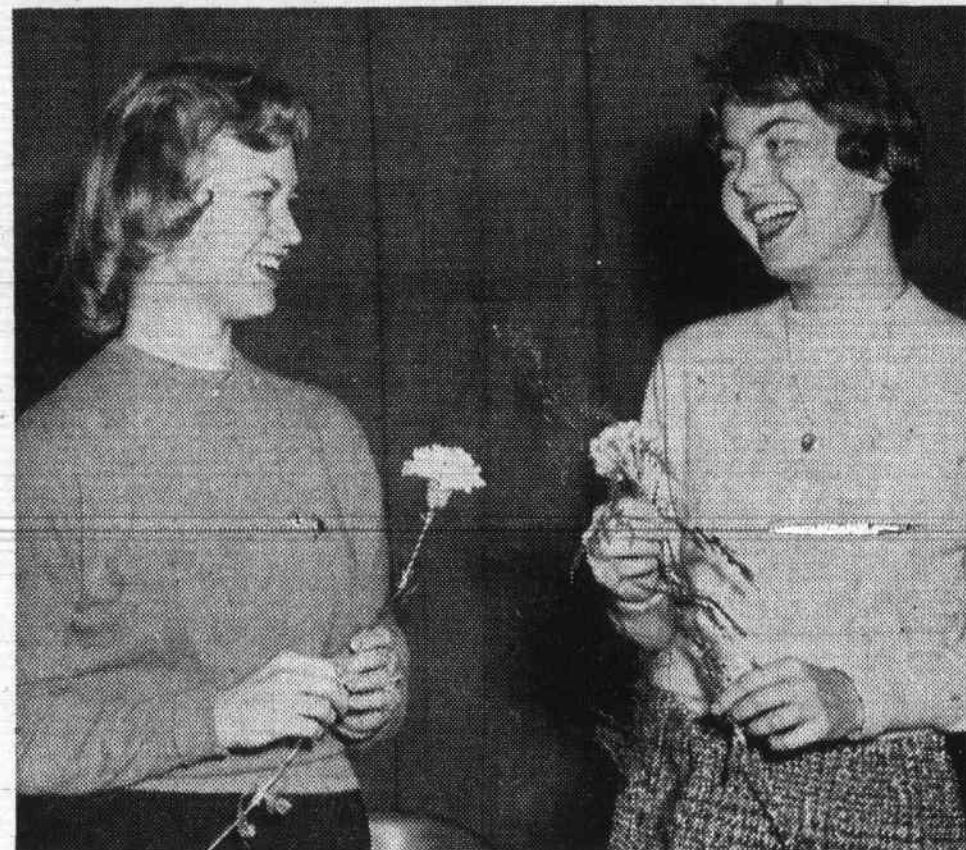

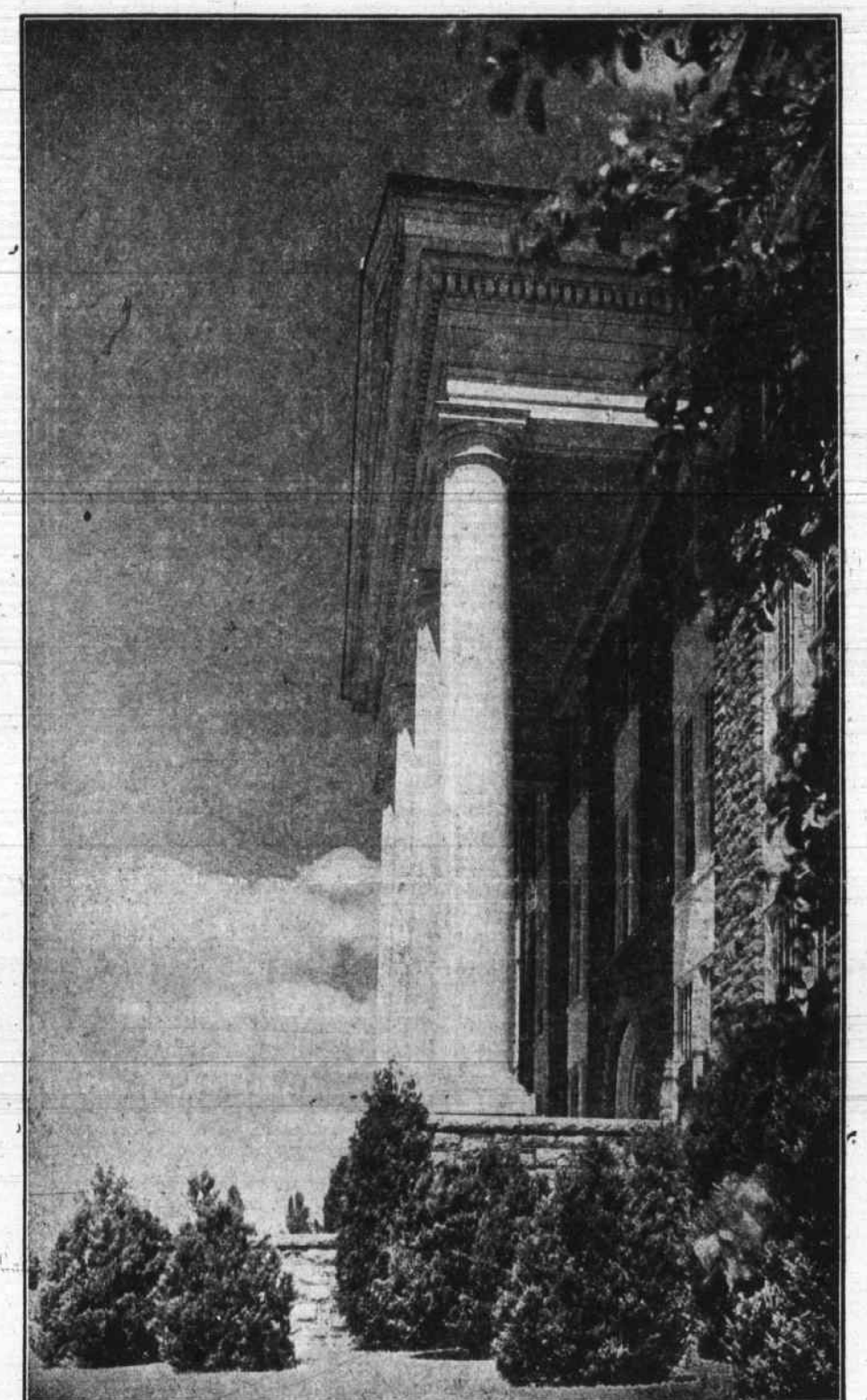

Elected to the United States Senate in 1951, his many activities as a senator include membership in the Governor's Advisory Board on the Budget, Senate Finance Committee, and chairman of the State Hospital Board for the Department of Mental Hygiene in Hospitals.

Also participating on the program will be the College Concert Choir. A tape recording of the entire proceedings will be made by W.S.V.A. This will be broadcast on Sunday, March 20, at 5:05-6:00 p.m.

A banquet will be served the students at their evening meal to conclude the Founder's Day activities.

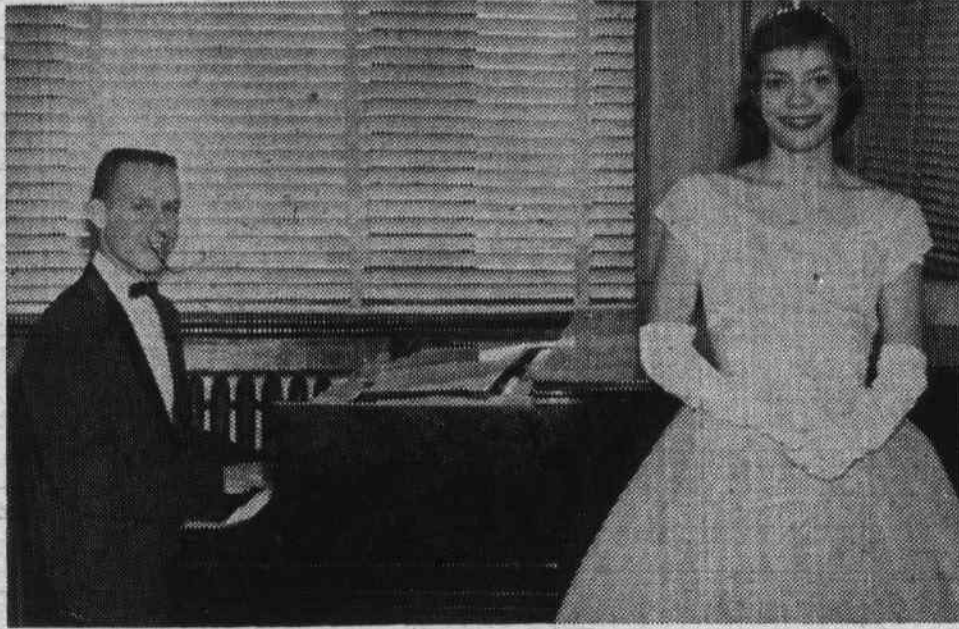

The Student Education Association will hold initiation for new members on Wednesday, March 17, at 6:30 p.m. New members are to wear white. The place will be announced.

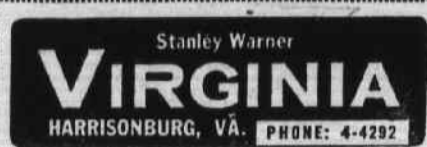
Plans for the SEA banquet for March 23 are well underway.
