Up C. Dr. AN IMPORTANT FACT. -The amended In-

ternal Revenue act was signed on the 13th of July. By its provisions, in all cases where the rate of taxation is increased or decreased, but taxation yet remains, the law is to go into effect on the 1st of August. But the sections relating to the impost upon whiskey beer and fermented liquors, are not to take effect until the 1st of September. The free list, however, went into effect upon the passage of the act, to wit, July 13th. From that date all liability for taxation ceased upon the articles named in the free list, which are numerous, ranging from "alum" down to "zinc." Familiarity with the free list is therefore, indispensible to manufacturers, and in making the returns for articles now exempted, liabitities to tax will cease with the 13th of July, inclusive .- Philadelphia Inqui-
