purpose." The Chief Justice then advanced up the aisle, clad in his official robe, escerted by Mr. Pomeroy, chairman of the committee appointed for that purpose, with Jidge Nelson of the Supreme Cart, on his right. Messrs. Buckalew and Wilson, the other members of the committee, bringing up the

The Clief Justice baving ascended to the President's chair, said, in a measured and

impressive voice: Senators: In obedi nee to notice, I have appeared to join with you in forming a court of impeachment for the trial of the President of the United States, and I am now ready to take the cath.

The following oath was then administered to the Chief Justice by Judge Nelson: 'I do solemnly swear, that in all the things pertaining to the trial of the impeachment of Antrew Johnson, President of the United States, I will do impartial justice, according to the constitution and laws, so help me God."

The Chief Justice then said:

Senators: The oath will now be adminstered to the Senators, as they will be called by the Secretary in succession.

The Secretary called the roll, each Sonator advancing in turn and taking the oath prescribed in the rules, as given above. The only Senators absent were Messrs. Doolittle, of Wisconsin; Edmunds, of Vermont; Patterson, of New Hampshich, and

San'sbury, of Deleware.

Mr. Wade's name having been called, he was advancing to take the oath, when Mr. Hendricks objected to Mr. Wade being sworn or taking part in the trial, on the ground that, a in event of conviction he would become President of the U. Reconstruction Conventions. SO CALLED. VIRGINIA. RICHMOND, Friday, March, 6, 1868.

The Convention met at 12 o'clock Prayer by the chaplain. FRANCHISE.

The franchise question was called up.

The secont exception clause to the first section of the report was adopted, as follows: .2. Persons convicted of bribery in

any election, embezzlement of public funds, treason, or felony." The third exception clause was then adopted, as follows :

"3. No person who, while a citizen of the State, has, since the adoption of this Constitution, fought a duel with a deadly weapon either within or beyond the boundaries of the State, or who has acted as second, or knowingly conveyed a challenge, or aided or assisted in any manner in fighting a duel, shall be allow ed to vote or hold any office of honor, profit, or trust, under this Constitution'

Mr. J. C. Gibson offered the following as the fourth clause: "All persons having less than three-fourths Caucausian blood" Lost.

The fourth exception clause was then adopted, as follows:

"Rvery person who has been a senator or representative in Congress, or elector of president or vice president; or who held any office, civil or military, under the United States, or under any State who, having previously taken an oath as | Big Egg. a member of any State Legislature, as an executive or judicial officer of any State, to support the Constitution of the United States, shall have engaged in insurrection or rebellion against the same, or given aid and comf rt to the enemies thereof This clause shall include the following officers: Governor, lieu enant governor, sceretary of state, auditor of public accounts, second register of the land office. state treasurer, attorney general, sheriffs, Are we ready for the election? Are sergeant of a city or town, commissioners les overseers of the poor, commissioners of the board of public works, judges of the circuits, judge of the court of hustings, justices of the county courts, mayor, recorder, town councilmen, and aldermen of a city or town, coroners, escheaters, inspectors of tobacco, flour, etc., clerks of the supreme, district, circuit, and county courts, and of the court of hust ings, and attorneys for the common.

Mr. Sneed offered the following amendment to the last clause, but it was voted

"Voting for the ratification of the ordinance of scession, or acts of humanity extended to the so called - Confederate soldiers, or acts of kindness by parents to their sons whilst in the so-called Confederate armies, shall not be deemed such engaging in rebellion, or giving aid or comfort, as is mentioned above.'

The fifth exception clause was then adopted, by a vote of 54 to 35-it is as

"Every person who acted as a commissioned officer above the rank of first lieutenant in the army or master in the navy in any military or naval organization opposed to the United States during the late war "

Mr. Williams said that he would not vote. He did not think the Convention had, under the reconstruction acts, any right to vote upon this. He believed conscientiously that the Convention would transcend its powers i the clause were adopted. He believed in his heart that he would perjure himself if he voted generally, upon the subject.

After an ineffectual attempt to force Mr. Williams to vote, the House adjourned.

SATURDAY, March 9 -- White offered a resolution that Williams had given a gross insult to the house by refusing to vote, and moved for a committee to investigate it-adopted

When Mr Liggett's name was called to vote on this proposition, he said :

"I refuse to vote through contempt and disgust at this proposition.' Mr Porter: "I hope we will go to

work and expel Mr. Williams first, and Mr. Liggett afterwards." The following committee was appoint-

ed: White, Allan, Curtiss, Woodson. Owen, Maddox, and Scott.

EXPULSION OF MR LIGGETT.

Mr. White offered the following: "Whereas Jacob N. Liggett, a delegate in this Convention from the county of Rockingham, did on the 7th day of March, violate the twenty ninth adopted for the government of this body by rising when his name was called and saying, "I refuse to vote because I am disgus ed with the whole proposition,' or words to that effect, thereby adding sult to gross violation of the rules as above stated : therefore be it

"RESOLVED, That the said Jueob N iggett be expelled from this Convention, and from this date cease to be a member thereof"

Mr. Porter moved its adoption.

Considerab'e discussion and confusion Mr French arose to a point of order. He thought the Convention was proceed ing out of order, and not secording to the rules of the House. The gentleman should have an opportunity to vindicate

The Chair decided the point well taken. Anappeal was taken from 'his decision. Mr. Liggett said that he waived all claims to defend himself. He repeated his remarks. He had a disgust for the whole Radical conceru; and he had no

apology to make.

Mr. Porter: "He repeats his insult. Let's go on and cut off his head." The Convention sustained the appeal

from the decision of the Chair. The vote was taken, after further con fusion and discussion, and the resolution adopted by a vote of 51 ayes-16 nays.

The McCardle case is still before the Supreme Court. Judge Black made an able argument for the prisoner last Tuesday, Feb 3.
