The Soda Lake of Mexico. The Lake of Tesceco, a short distance from the capital of Mexico, and communicating with the city by means of a canal, is one of the greatest natural curiosities of that country . In the centre is a barren island with a hill com posed of volcanie rock, and known as ist Penun de los Banos, or rock of the Saths, rising from the Aurface. This desolate spot, is famous for the manuacture of crude sods, for tequesquite, a manufacture not more remarkable for its primitive method than its wast re-Sources . " The Cearth Tof Whe valley Hadjoining the lake is impregnated with a species of soda; and Lake Tesceco itself is a concentrated solution of soura. It contains an immense deposit of the salts of sodium, chiefly the chloride of sodium and the carbonate of soda. The Lake | has great surface and small depth, and with a rainy season of four months and a dry season of eight, its range of expansion and contraction is from 220 square miles at its maximum to 80 square miles at its minimum. A calculation of the contents of the lake was made in 1851, when it was considerably contracted, and the proportion of solid matter was ascertained to be not less than 18 per cent. The Penon soda

Every grain of body power, ability of motion or effort is derived from the food we est; stimulant spirits and mental excitement call out that power in natural quantities, but the power itself is derived from the food, through the agency, the medium of the nerves and muscles. The food does three things betore ing the winter for the next season's power is produced; it warms, it builds up, t repairs; and ability to work is the result; This process of repair and building may be called nourishing. In general the elements of all power proper for animal life contain both warmth and nourishment, such as meat and bread; but fruits impart no warmin while oil, sugar and starch contain little less than the articles of warmth. 18

The first necessity for infants is warmth the milk on which they feed contains both oil and sugares They woulds die without sweets. The body is warmed by process of combustion, a burning up of the carbon of the system. Sugars, oits, and starches are almost entirely carbon. This burning of carbon is kindled and carried on by means of air which is breathed into the lungs.

The more we exercise, the faster or deepe we breathe, and the more air we take into the lungs; hence exercise is said "to warm up " The product of combustion is carbonic, which is exhausted during sleep, is represented by nineteen; while lying down awake, twenty-three; while walking at a rate of two miles per hour, seventy-three; three miles per hour, one hundred and seventy-five.

Now, as the carbonic acid gas passing out of the system represents the amount of impurity carried on from it, it seems at once the powerful agency which exercise has in renthis carbonic acid is taken out of the blood in the lungs by the process of breathing.

When sitting in a room, this carbonic acid gas which comes from the lungs hovers around the head and face to some extent, and is, with all its impurities rebreathed ; but when working, riding or walking out of doors, it is catried away by the wind , bence every breath of out-door air is a pure breath; hence, too. the great superiority of outdoor exercise, a means of health, above indoor

Different kinds of food have various proportions of elements of power; that is, we can work longer on a pound of bread than on a pound of cabbage.

Scientific men have arrived at the follow-

ing proportions. The table should read thus:
One pound of cabbage gives 2 degrees of strength; milk, 2; carrots, 21; white of egg, 31; apples, 2; butter, 3; potatoes, 5; lean beef, 71; hard boiled eggs, 10; bread 12; isinglass, 17; trice, 174; catmeal, 18; flour, 18; lump sugar, 18; Cheshira cheese, 19; arrowroot 19; cocea nibs, 82; fat beef, 14; cod liver oil, 41.—Methodist.

THE STAY-LAW-A SUGGESTION.

We have not discussed any PRINCIPLE involved in the proposition, for the rea somethat there is no active practical officiple implicated in the question, except that the Stay Law is a palpable departure from fundamental principle. The Constitution, bowever, which is the fundamental law of the land, was enacted at a time when such an abnormal state of things as now exists was not contemplated. It was not made to meet the exigencies growing out of such a desolating internecine conflict as that from which the country has just emerged. It was not framed for revolutions, but to Karmonize with the interests and advance the prosperity of a people who were united in the great controlling flibrati of uniform, national progress. The Stay Law enacted to suit the demands of an anomalous and unprecedented state of affairs, in the fivancial conditon of the people, had necessarily to ignore the fundamental law, devised to meet an entirely new condition of mone futy complications, and therefore became att EXPEDIENT, and not a principle. We should deplore the day when stay laws became chronic-engrafted upon the organie law of the State. While the present law was doubtless suggested and framed in a spirit of generous philanthrophy designed to ameliorate the suffering of the pople, we are well convinced that it has operated harmfully, and exemplifies the fact that simple, pure, unadusterated honesty is the exception to the generality of mankind. Debtors have not struggled to avail themselves of its humane provisions to meet by degrees their obligations. In the majority of cases they have acted with tantalizing judinerence to the fair and honest demands of the creditor. The consequence is, that the ereditor class, who, at the close of the war, felt a common sympathey with the debtor case, and were wil. ling to accommodate their demands to the condition of the debror, have become soured, if not exasperated, and would now deal mith more severity and harshness than they would have done two years We do not think the interests of either the creditor or the debtor, or of the community, would be subserved by permitting the spirit thus engendered to go unbridled free to wreak the vengeance which real or imagined wrongs have conspired to infuse into it.

In instances of this kind, if the debtor is not able or willing to comply with an immediate reason. able demand, let the property revert to the vendor at the original price, with a fair quivalent for its use.

We have all passed through common trials and are environed by common difficulties and complications. Let our better natures assert supremacy in this trying ordeal, and practice that humano principle so beautifully inculcated by the Good Book-"Do unto others as we would that others should do unto us."

With some auch spirit to animate and govern our people, Virginia will vet throw off her weeds of mourning, rise equal to the trials that beset her, and Stay Law in general terms. We have show to the world a character as grand in her desolation, as noble in her poverty, as ever shed lustre around the history of any people singe society was organized.

The adoption of any less considerate course could not fail to operate disastrously to creditor, debto on I community, and would create a spirit of reckless disregard for moral obligation, which might eventually find vent in flagrant repudiation. It is not safe to mercilessly drive men to the wall. The worm when trod upon will recoil, and human nature has some of the instinct of the "creeping things of the earth." A stern and relentless policy adopted to enforce the immediate payment of debts, would force the creditor's property from his control, without satisfying the claim of she creditor. Our own people have not the ready cash to buy, and the result would be that strangers resident in more affluent States would become the purch asers of our lands at mere pominal prices Let the spirit of justice, tempered with mercy, control our people, and they can "became a law unto themselves," helping each other, and thus contribute to the general good of the State.

THE FINANCIAL QUESTION.

The question of our national finances is likely to receive that attention on the part of Congress which its importance demands. It is agreed on all hands that the credit of the Government can only. be reinstated and sustained by the resumption of specie payments at the earliest possible moment.

Gov Morton, Senator from Indiana. in an able speech on this question, has brought out many important facts, to waich we propose briefly to call the at-Different kinds o englar our readers o abelia description

He is opposed to any contraction of the currency, preliminary to the resumption of specie payments. He estimates the circulating medium, previous to the war, including bank notes and gold and silver, at \$450,000,000. In addition to this, bills of exchange were used to the amount of several millions more. He then argues that the present greenback and bank circulations do not bear any greater proportion to the increase of population and the expansion of the business of the country, than the amount named bore to the condition of our commerce and business previous to the war.

He says that two means have been suggested for returning to specie payments. First, to legalize specific contracts to be executed in coin; secondly, he refers to the recommendation of the Secretary of the Treasury, "that it be declared that af ter the 1st day of January, 1870, United States notes shall cease to be a legal tender in payment of all private debts subsequently contracted; and that after the 1st day of January, 1871, they shall cease to be a legal tender on any contract, or for any purpose whatever, ex cept government dues, for which they are now receivable." This will retire from circulation any surplus in the currency not required by the commerce and business of the country. ".su The speaker contended that sales of gold by the government should be at once stopped, and that it should only be used in payment of interest on the pub lic debt and to provide for the resump tion of specie payments. Specie now sold does not go into circulation, but be comes an article of traffic in the hand of brokers and speculators. By fixing a day, say in two years, for the resumn tion of specie payments, and saving the gold in the treasury for that purpose, the credit of the government may be restor ed and the paper currency of the country raised to a specie standard.

On motion of John C Woodson, Esq., Col N. Bare was called to the chair, and Messrs. Maj. S M Yost, and Capt. Ran. D. Cushen chosen secretaries.

Mr. Woodson explained the object of the meeting and endorsed the extension of the Stay Law, in some modifi d form, beyond the 1st of Janurary, until the subject could be considered by the Legislature. Geo H. Chrisman, Esq , was called for

and addressed the meeting in opposition to the proposed petition. He did not believe the Stay Law ought to be extended, nor that it would be of any practical benefit to cither debtors or creditors, if it were J. N. Liggett, Esq., was then called for and delivered an able address in favor of the proposed petition. He drew a graphic picture of the suffering that he said, must result to the State, if the Stay Law is not extended in some form. He said there was not money enough in the State to pay the debts owed by the people, and that the consequence would be the sicrafice of property of every description. He argued that it would be as dishonest for the creditor to sacrifice the debtor's property, as it is for the debtor to refuse to pay his debts when

THE RAILROAD DEMONSTRATION.

The writer of this communication is a resident of Rockingham, but not of the town of Harrisonburg. He had heard of the incipient steps to express the feelings of the people of this great county, as suggested by the arrival of the cars of the Manassas Itali Road at Harrisonburg. It was proposed, and the proposition was acted upon and adopted, in the Clerk's office, some weeks since, by a squad of men numbering not over a dozen—the principal participants being those who were not fitted, by habits of thought, to digest a plan for anything—to give a grand bachanalian jubilee on the lat of January, 1869, to be gotten up by contributions from the honest reomanry of the county. A few days were sufficient to demonstrate that the good common sense of the people of Rockingham had no sympathy, with any such inopportune and inappropriate exhibition. The suggestion was subsequently modified, and the design of the light-cop's originators utterly repudiated. Having, however, received publicite, it was tho't best by gentlemen who appreciated the impolicy of the primary notion, to compromise the matter, and of course the fathers of the original design, having no comprehension sufficient to meet so ponderous a subject, instantly abandoned the primary arrangement, and concluded to give a public reception and dinner to the President and Directors of the Orange, Alexandria and ponderous a subject, instantly abandoned the primary arrangement, and concluded to give a public reception and dinner to the President and Directors of the Orange, Alexandria and Manassas Gap Railroad, such invited guests as were favored with 2 free ticket, and such others as chose to gratify the cravings of an impoverished appetite. Tuesday, the 22 inst., was designated as the day when this public demonstration was to take place. The welcoming address was delivered by a gentleman selected for the purpose by the committee. He was followed by several gentlemen of Rockingham county, of whose efforts it is not the purpose of this communication to speak. But what it is the purpose to make public, is that the demonstration given on Tuesday last, was not from the people of Rockingham county. The want of concert, the absence of arrangement, the general inefficiency, and failure of the whole affair, is justly attributable to the few scattered-brained individuals who originally assumed the directorship of the movement. They are responsible, and none others, for the humiliating exhibitions of intellectual grasp and comprehensive appreciation of the occasion.

The strangers visiting Harrisonburg, on the occasion, will properly measure the pesple of this great county. There is no similar area of territory which carries upon its bosom more good, practical sense than Rockingham. But for the sake of a little fleeting notoriety—not enviable by any means—a few of the human myriapods, which occassonally rise to the surface by a spasmodic strain of the muscles, originated, devised and cavried through the humiliating fizzle which transpired in Harrisonburg on Tuesday last.

THE "SITUATION" IN VIRGINIA.

took place at the court-house, at one o'clock, by calling Gen. G. S. Meem, of Shenandoah, to the chair and appointing Ran. D. Cushen and John H. Wartmann secretaries. chairman called the meeting to order, and in a few appropriate remarks thanked the citizens of Rockingham for the honor conferred apon

James Kenney, Esq., in a meat and appropriate address, in behalf of the people of Harrisonburg and of the Sibizens of Rockingham county) welcomed the guests from Alexandria. Ballimore, and the countries along the line of the road, to our midst, and cordially invited them to participate in the hospitalities, of the occasion. He congratulated the citizens of Alexandria and of Rocking ham upon the final arealization of hopes no long deferred. He said that, by the completion of this great work, the people of the low lands had been brought in direct communication with the stured agriculturists and tradesmen of the great Valley of Virginia. 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
