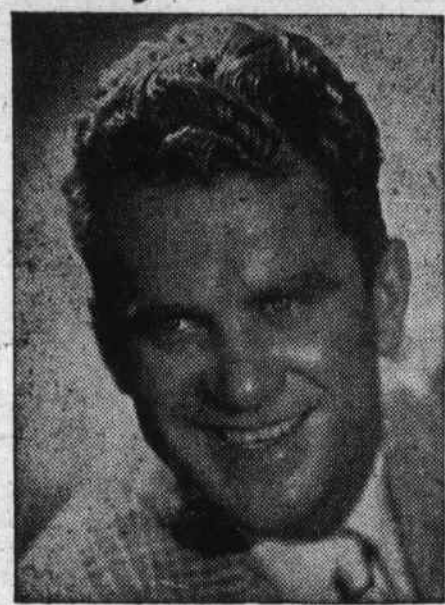

### Stratford To Enact Mystery In Spring

Stratford Players has chosen *Suspect* by Edward Percy and Reginald Denham for spring production on April 1 and 2. *Suspect* is a three act murder drama concerned with a woman who, twenty years before, stood trial for the murder of her father and step-mother in Scotland. The verdict was "not proven." Since that time she has lived in seclusion, as Mrs. Smith, in the South of England with her faithful maid. The excitement of the play comes when the father and god-father of her son's fiancé arrive and recognize the maid as having been one of the witnesses in the murder trial. The two men close in on Mrs. Smith in an attempt to barr from her the truth. During the cross-examination she again fights for her life and her son's future, convincing them that she is innocent. It is a good thing that they don't see what the audience sees as the curtain falls.

The part of Mrs. Smith will be played by Barbara Wolfe, who was seen last spring as one of the aunts in "I Remember Mama"; Carol Lyn Russell, who played a short role in "I Remember Mama," will act the Scottish maid. Carol Lyn is vice-president of Stratford Players. Harry Lee Ruebush and Connie Faulder, both seen last in "Stage Door", will play the roles of Mrs. Smith's son and his fiancée. Edgar McConnell and Jo Gildersleeve will play the Sir Hugo and Lady Const roles. Edgar has played in several of the Stratford productions and is President of the organization this year. The roles of Dr. Rendle and Reverend Combermere will be played by Francis Mason and Myrl Dake.

The businessmen, who are members of the same civic organizations, have been all too generous in lending us props for class day's and campaigns, in submitting ads to the newspaper and yearbook, in advertising college events, and last—but definitely not least—in making our May Day Parade possible. How do they feel now?

Thirdly, we the students are to blame somewhat. We have voiced our disapproval of this policy—but there it is dropped. There have been no letters to the editor; there have been no petitions started. If we want our opinions heard and evaluated accordingly then we must make them known—through the proper channels.

Therefore, if the majority of the student body is against such a "long established" policy why don't we petition this measure, and let it be known that we do disapprove although it probably will do no good. At least we can say we tried!
