REV. DR. NEWMAN AMONG THE MORMONS.

Lost work we referred to the fact that Rev J. P. Newman, pastor of the great Methodist Metropolitan Church in Washington City, and the acknowledged organ of the President, had gone to Salt Lake City for the purpose of discussing the question of polygamy with Brigham Young, the great Mogul of Mormonismow he was snubbed by the illustrious end of the church of Latter Day Saints. and how he retaliated by preaching a tremendous sermon against the Mormon sin, of three-and a-half hours in duration.

It gives us great pleasure to announce, Lowever, that, notwithstanding Dr. Newman's failure to meet the so-called prophet, an arrangement was made for a discussion with Elder Orson Pratt, Young's righthand man. Finding that Young had not challenged him, the irrepressible Doctor challenged the prophet, and the happy husband of numerous wives and father of a multitude of children saddled the responsibility of defending the Mormon faith upon Elder Pratt,

The preliminaries having been settled, the discussion was opened by Elder Pratt-the question being, "Does the Bible Sanction Polygamy?" He quoted all the passages in the Bible that refer to the subject, and from which it could be inferred that polygamy was practiced, in justification of the Mormon abomina-

Dr. Newman scattered the Elder's ingeniously-constructed arguments like chaff before the wind. He gave David, and all the old polygamists of olden time, a tremendous drubbing, and showed that he sinners of the present day had less excuse for their evil-doing. Our cham. pions told the wicked Mormons that, "if it was right for one man to have many wives, it was right for a woman to have many husbands." This created considerable laughter and applause, the women especially seeming to enjoy the joke.

In this encounter with the vagabonds of Sait Lake, according to the account given in the Washington Chronicle, the President's preacher made a profound impression among the more honest and reflecting portion of the Mormons.

Nothing was said by either of the least some of our Congressmen, and many others occupying high places in the government, of doing, secretly and clandestinely, precisely what the Mormons bre dufa g openly and above board. Practically, there secret polygamists are do. ing as much friury to society as the besotted Mormons. They ought to have received a sound dra, bing at the hands of the champion of Congress. One is as guilty as the other, so far an its demorals izing influence is concerned, and both classes ought to be dealt with with equal severity. If the Mormons practice and justify a plurality of wives, some of our great men oppose polygamy while they practice it. We condemn both classes, as sinners against common decency and against rociety.

The Pope of Rome has offered his friend'y mediation in the war between France and Prussia-addressing his proposition directly to the King of Prussin. This offer of u.ediation, on the part of the Pope, made to the Protestant party in the struggle, would seem to indicate that the holy father regards Prussia as the stronger power.
