THE DEGISLATURE met in Richmond on the 1st instant, but in consequence of the detention of many of the members by the late flood, there was no quorum present. On Thursday, however, a majority of both Houses were present, and the unfinished business of the previous

session was resumed.

Gov. Walker sent in a message, in which he gives his reasons for having withheld his signature to four of the bills presented to him on the last day of the provious sess on. The first, was an act amendatory of cevi. chapter of the Code, relative to grand juries. Of this, the Governor says :

The bill provides that there shall be a grand jury at wo of the terms of the county and corporation courts, and at as many other terms as the courts or judges, respective ly, may deem necessary. At each of the terms first mentioned twenty-four jure; s are to be summoned, but the court may limit the number to sixteen; for all other terms of the court only ten jurors are to be sum-moned, and the court may limit the number to six. In case the jury is sixteen or over, twelve must concur in finding an inment: but if the jury is composed of but six or ten, five must concur in finding an indict Why is this difference made in the grand juries for the different terms of the same court? Both are to possess like qual-ifications, are summoned and sworn in the same manner, and charged with the investigation of the same grade of crimes; in fac', are precisely similar in all their characteristics and functions, save only in numbers. I confess that I fail to comprehend the necessity for a larger grand jury at one term of the court than at another, &c.

The second, is an act relative to the appointment of notaries public. The act so amends the Code as to require that, before the Governor shall appoint a notary public, the applicant shall exhibit to him the certificate of a county, corporation, or circuit judge, as to his character and fitness for the office. The Governer regards this provision as a restriction upon the appointing power of the State Executive, and hence his objections to it.

The third was an act entitled the Rockingham Mutual Fire Insurance Company. Of this the Governor says:

This bill charters a company of an extra ordinary character and with unusual powers The 8th section declares that "the said com pany, being simply a contract of partner-ship, limited to the purposes of mutual as-surance under the restrictions imposed by this charter, having no salaried officers, and having no paid up capital stock, shall be exempt from the taxation imposed upon other er companies as insurance companies." This is certainly a very remarkable section. The organization proposed can no more be design nated as "simply a contract of parinership than any other insurance company; and there is no prohibition in the charter to its having what will be absolutely necessary, viz. salaried officers and some paid-up capi-Brt. suppose it has no paid-up capital, no salaried officers, and is merely a copart-Is that any reason for exempting it from all taxation as an insurance compary during its existence? The constitution provides that (axatiou shall be "equal and uniform," and the Legislature, in my opins ion, can make no exemption except as pro-vided for in Article X, section 4.

The fourth, "an act to incorporate the James River Bridge Company," the Governor declined to sign, because its provisions seemed to conflict with the vested rights and corporate privileges of the owners of Mayo's Bridge in a manner not warranted by the constitution.

Leave of absence was granted J. E Roller, Esq., by the Senate, for one week, for the purpose of permitting him to attend the Southern Commercial Convention which assembled in Cincinnatti

Mr. Taylor of Loudoun offered a joint resolution, in the Senate, that when the two Houses adjourn on the 7th day of November next they adjourn sine die.

In the House, Mr. Hanger of Augusta offered a similar resolution, fixing the 5th as the day of adjournment -76 members voting in the affirmative.

The House bill in relation to carrying concealed weapons was taken up, amended and ordered to its engrossment. It provides for a penalty, on conviction, of \$30 and imprisonment for 12 months, at the discretion of the court, one-half to go to the informer.

The joint resolution, providing that the Legislature will pass no act repudiating either public or private debts, in whole or in part, and "that such legislation would be no less destructive to our future prosperity than our credit, our integrity, and our honor," was ordered to diers killed in the war and to the wounded. its third reading.

CINCINNATI, October 4 .- The Southern Commercial Convention assembled this mornng at ten o'clock in Pike's Hall, one hundred and fifty delegates being present. The convention was called to order by S. M. Bishop, vice president for Onio of the Louis-Hon. George H. Pendleton was introduced

and made a reception address. He said: Friends: Every industrial interest, and advocates of every growing enterprise from the Alleghanies to the Rocky mountains, attest the dignity of this convention and the magnitude of the questions committed to its consideration. Your predecessors, who met at Norfolk in 1868, were few in numbers, and the chief subject of their consideration was the ocean trade of the Atlantic cities with Europe. Your numbers already reach many hundreds, and your debates will touch every project of material development, every place of intelligent industry, every facility of commercial intercourse, every plan of finance and taxation, every encouragement of immi-gration, every question of governmental

This Convention meets to consider and advance the interests of the great Mississippi Valley. Are, centre and source of the well being of other portions of the country, its de velopment is their growth, its prosperity touches into life any dormant element of power which nature has hidden in its fields, mines, lakes or river, they grow by its activ ity and move under its impulsion. The Mississippi Valley! The very name calls up a vision of transcendent grandeur—lands teeming with cotton, rice, sugar, corn, barley. It stretches from central Pennsylvania to the western boundary of Kansas, from the Lake of the Woods to the Gulf of Mexico. Its soils are fertile, its mines productive, its for-

He warned them off, but not heeding his admonition, he fired and seven of them fell at the first and only shot, some of them slightly, others more severely, but none of them, we believe, seriously hurt.— The shot was a random one, and a little child was among those who felt its effect, slightly. Dr. Fauntleroy was called to the wounded— a warrant issued for Rice—who immediately left for parts unknown, and so the matter rests for the present.

Ravages of Yellow Fever in Spain.

MADEID, October 1 .- The peninsula is in the greatest state of alarm at the continued spead of yellow fever. The epidemic is more serious than at first supposed. The terror stricken inhabitants of Barcelona are flying from the place. There were forey-nine deaths there on Friday. About one hundred and twenty thousand persons have left. The exodus of people has alarmed other provinces and moved the government to adopt scrict sanitary measures. Nine hundred children of the orphan and foundling asylums have been removed to the country. Hundreds of tickets have been issued to poor families who left their hovels to take quarters temporarily in the magnificent monastery of Moutealegre. Breeding lowls, rabbits and other domestic animals are prohibited in the city. Washe. women are prohibited to take clothes from Barcelona to the suburbs. All vessels are inspected and fumigated.

The fever is remarkably fatal in its attacks, but is confined to Barcelona and the Mediter ranean coast. A cordon has been established and people are prohibited leaving the interior towns. Vessels from Cuba are subjected to seven days' quarantine; coasting vessels the same. Railway carriages and goods are fumigated at the first station out of Barcelona. A number of vessels entered the laza. retto with the fever on board.

## LOCAL AFFAIRS.

More About the Flood-Incidents, &c.

Last week we gave all the reliable in formation we could gather relative to the terrible freshet that visited our Valley, and the destruction of property and loss of life resulting from it. We have since conversed with a gentleman who had spent several days in visiting the scene of desolation along the South River, from Port Republic some forty or fifty miles down the river, and his description of the loss of property and the suffering that has been entailed upon the people is fearful to think of.

As far as we can learn, but three flouring mills have escaped the general destruction, on the river, in this county and Page-viz: Hon. John F. Lewis's mill; the Ammon mill, now owned by Messrs. Melhorn, Lewin aud Shaver; and Bear's mill, near Shenandoah Iron Works. The water-power of these mills was badly injured, and the lower stories more or less damaged. The greater portion of the wheat and flour in them was either destroyed or so much damaged as to be almost entirely worthless.

In addition to the loss of many dwelting houses, barns, and other buildings, not mentioned in former accounts, we are informed that the injury done to the farms along the river is incalculable. In many instances the soil has been entirely washed off, and whole fields may be seen covered with barren rocks, deep gullies, and ponds of water.

Where the river's course is obstructed by the mountain ridges, or hills and bluffs, immense quantities of lumber from buildings destroyed, timber, rails, corn, &c., are to be found, from which the sufferers in many instances get what they can for the subsistence of hogs and other stock that was fortunate enough to escape the devouring element.

Giant like trees along the river, that had withstood the storms and floods of a century, were either levelled with the ground by the surging waters and the immense amount of floating drift, or torn up by the roots and carried down by the resistless current. The crashing of buildings, lumber, and other things. when they were obstructed by the heavy timber, or other obstacles, is described as having been awful in the extreme.

Graveyards, in which the dead had been deposited for many years, were washed away, and the coffins torn to pieces and distributed among the drifts along the river. Pieces of these coffins were found at and near the Shenandoah Iron Works.

A coffin containing a child, but recently deceased, apparently from 3 to 5 years of age, was found on the premises of one of the Kites, below the Shenandoah Iron Works. It was decently buried, and if this should meet the eye of the bereaved parties, whoever they may be, they can obtain all necessary information relative to the child by making enquiry of any one in the neighborhood of the Iron Works.

REGISTRATION .- It has already been star ted through our columns that the registrars in the several Townships will meet fifteen days previous to the election for the purpose of registering the names of such persons as were not registered at the former election .-They will therefore sit for that purpose on Monday and Tuesday the 24th and 25th instant. Those who were registered last May, of course need not register again.
