At various times, since our connection with this paper, we have taken occasion, and with no little pleasure, to refer to the improvements made at these works since they had passed into the hands of the present proprietors.

Not even a stone is left to mark the place where so recently stood the Shenandoah Iron Works. All, all, save and except the dwellings recently erected on an eminence, are gone.

The bill provides that there shall be a grand jury at two of the terms of the county and corporation courts, and at as many other terms as the courts or judges, respectively, may deem necessary.

The second, is an act relative to the appointment of notaries public. The act so amends the Code as to require that, before the Governor shall appoint a notary public, the applicant shall exhibit to him the certificate of a county, corporation, or circuit judge, as to his character and fitness for the office.

The third, was an act entitled the Rockingham Mutual Fire Insurance Company. Of this the Governor says:

This bill charts a company of an extraordinary character and with unusual powers. The 5th section declares that "the said company, being simply a contract of partnership, limited to the purposes of mutual assurance under the restrictions imposed by this charter, having no salaries or officers, and having no paid-up capital stock, shall be exempt from the taxation imposed upon other companies as insurance companies."

Leave of absence was granted J. E. Roller, Esq., by the Senate, for one week, for the purpose of permitting him to attend the Southern Commercial Convention which assembled in Cincinnati on the 5th instant.

Mr. Taylor of Loudoun offered a joint resolution, in the Senate, that when the two Houses adjourn on the 7th day of November next they adjourn sine die.

In the House, Mr. Hanger of Augusta offered a similar resolution, fixing the 5th as the day of adjournment—76 members voting in the affirmative.

The House bill in relation to carrying concealed weapons was taken up, amended and ordered to its engrossment. It provides for a penalty, on conviction, of \$50 and imprisonment for 12 months, at the discretion of the court, one-half to go to the informer.

The joint resolution, providing that the Legislature will pass no act repudiating either public or private debts, in whole or in part, and that such legislation would be no less destructive to our future prosperity than our credit, or our integrity, and our honor," was ordered to its third reading.

The Republicans of the Alexandria district, we take it for granted, will generally vote for Hon. Lewis McKenzie, the present representative, or no convention. His Conservative opponent, Col. Braxton, the regular nominee of our party, we have no doubt will be elected; but if we had to choose between Republicans, we should take Mr. McKenzie in preference to some others.

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CONGRESSIONAL CONVENTION.

In pursuance of the call of the State Executive Committee for the sixth Congressional District, the Conservative Convention met in the African M. E. Church in Harrisonburg, on Wednesday, October 6, 1870.

At 12 o'clock the Convention was called to order by Col. A. W. Harnam of Augusta; and, on his motion, N. B. Meade of Frederick was elected temporary president, and S. M. Yost of Rockingham requested to act as secretary pro tem.

It was also moved that all the Editors present, connected with the Conservative press of the District, be requested to act as assistant secretaries.

On motion, the president appointed a committee on credentials, consisting of two delegates from each county represented, as follows:

Augusta, M. G. Harman and R. W. Burke; Rockingham, S. H. Moffett and J. H. Halston; Shenandoah, J. B. Strayer and L. Triplett; Frederick, John M. Miller and R. W. Hunter; Clarke, M. G. Hardesty and U. L. Boyce.

On motion, the committee was instructed to report, also, the number of votes to which each county in the District is entitled, and the number of votes to be cast by each delegate.

On motion, the Convention then took a recess until half past two o'clock.

AFTERNOON SESSION. The Convention met at 2 o'clock, and was called to order by the president pro tem. The committee on credentials, through their chairman, M. G. Harman, made the following report:

Your Committee have the honor to report that the counties of Allegheny, Botetourt, Bath, Highland, Page, Rockbridge and Warren are not represented.

From the county of Frederick there are 21 delegates, regularly appointed—4 Townships unrepresented.

From the county of Shenandoah there are present 16 regular delegates—two Townships unrepresented.

Your Committee recommend that the Conservative vote cast for Governor Walker be served as the basis of representation—each delegate present casting his pro rata share of the vote of his county.

On motion of Robert W. Burke, of Augusta, Resolved, That when this Convention adjourns, it adjourn to meet on Thursday the 13th day of October, 1870, at Harrisonburg.

On motion of Charles A. Yancey, of Rockingham, Resolved, That such Counties and Townships as have failed to appoint delegates to this Convention be requested to hold meetings and select delegates to an adjourned meeting of this Convention, on the 13th of October, next.

On motion of U. L. Boyce, of Clarke, Resolved, That the President and Vice Presidents of this Convention be appointed a committee to have the proceedings of this Convention published in circular form; and that the same be sent to the Counties that are unrepresented, with a request that they send delegates to the adjourned session of this Convention to be held on the 13th instant.

On motion of N. B. Meade, of Clarke, Resolved, That the thanks of this Convention be tendered to our colored brethren for their courtesy in extending to us the use of their church on this occasion.

On motion, Resolved, That the Conservative editors of this District be requested to publish the proceedings of this Convention.

On motion of R. W. Burke, Resolved, That this Convention do now adjourn, to assemble again in this place on Thursday the 13th instant.

Southern Commercial Convention.

CINCINNATI, October 4.—The Southern Commercial Convention opened this morning at ten o'clock in Pike's Park, one hundred and fifty delegates being present.

The convention was called to order by S. M. Bishop, vice president for Ohio of the Louisville Convention.

Hon. George H. Pendleton was introduced, and made a reception address. He said: Friends, Every industrial interest, and advocate of every sort of industry, from the Alleghenies to the Rocky mountains, attest the dignity of this convention and the magnitude of the questions committed to its consideration.

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St. Louis, Oct. 5.—It is reported that the coal mine at Caseyville, Ill., has caved in, burying thirty-five men.

The Election in Rome.

ROME, October 3.—The voting yesterday was orderly throughout until the polls were closed at six o'clock. The result, as was generally supposed, was nearly unanimous in favor of Italian unity. The returns, as far as received, show that about 47,000 votes were cast throughout the "patrimony," of which only 65 were for the Pope. The result is heralded everywhere with enthusiasm.

Later returns show that over 60,000 were cast in favor of Italian unity and less than 50 against it. Several monks and priests voted yes.

The city was splendidly illuminated last night in honor of the result of the plebiscite. The best of order prevailed all day. The Italian flag floated from a hundred houses. A strong guard had been placed at each of the twelve voting places, but their services were not needed. Processions, with music, &c., marched through the streets to different polling places. The workmen went to their shops as usual.

It is reported that in consequence of the vote of the Leonine City having been cast unanimously for the rulership of Victor Emanuel, the P. P. will take up his residence at Malta.

THE OCTOBER ELECTIONS.—Elections are to be held on Tuesday, October 11, in Pennsylvania for 24 members of Congress, members of the Legislature, and county officers; in Ohio for Secretary of State, Supreme Court Judge, Comptroller, one member of the Board of Public Works, 19 members of Congress, and county officers; in Indiana for Secretary of State, and other State officers, and 11 members of Congress; in Iowa for a Secretary of State, Auditor, Treasurer, and other State officers, six members of the 42d Congress, and one for the 41st, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of William Smyth in the 2d district; and in Nebraska for Governor, a full State ticket, and member of Congress.

SHENANDOAH VALLEY RAILROAD.—A large meeting of the friends of the Shenandoah Valley road was held in Sharpsburg, Md., on Saturday evening, which was presided over by Dr. A. A. Biggs, was addressed by a number of prominent gentlemen, among whom were Messrs. Syester, Sohley Douglass and Neill, of Hagerstown. This road will be extended through Washington county, but where or upon what line has not yet been decided, and the object of the meeting was to urge citizens of that county to exert themselves in forwarding a work which will not only be of vast importance to them, but which will be one of the great lines of railway uniting the North with the South.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3.—There was an extraordinary session of the Cabinet to-day. Secretary Fish submitted a draft of a proclamation, which will be issued to-day or tomorrow, in effect prohibiting the use of our harbors by armed vessels of belligerents as points of observation or menace towards vessels in our waters about to have port. In other words, to prevent the virtual blockade of our port by armed vessels, and also forbidding our ports to be used as depots for supplying weapons and munitions of war to belligerents.

The powder works of Laft and Road Powder Company, about three miles from Ibttsville, Pa., exploded at noon on Saturday, destroying several buildings belonging to the works and killing two men who were engaged at work in the packing house. The bodies of the men were picked up in small pieces about the size of a hand or foot in every direction from the scene of disaster. The amount of powder exploded was between six hundred and seven hundred kegs. The shock was terrific and was experienced at a distance of sixteen miles.

HEIGHT OF THE FLOOD.—Mr. Joseph J. Pleasant, civil engineer, states that by actual measurement the height attained by the late flood over high-water mark at this point was twenty-four feet. This was seven feet three inches above the fresh of 1862.—Richmond Dispatch.

It is proposed, by the Masonic Lodge in Boylton, in this State, that the Grand Lodge of the State should purchase the property of the Randolph Mason College in that place, for a College to be under control of the Masonic fraternity.—Alex. Gazette.

GOLD FOUND.—We were shown on Saturday evening last a large piece of gold which was found in this county, in a wash, a few miles from town. We understand that parties are now negotiating for the purchase of the property.—Fredericksburg Herald.

It is stated that the Baltimore and Potomac Railroad Company will not repair the Long bridge over the Potomac at Washington, but will build a new one an one that will withstand all future floods.

Considerable alarm prevails in New York concerning the yellow fever. Cases of the epidemic still occur in the city, and the Board of Health is adopting stringent measures to prevent its spread.

General Sheridan writes to friends in Chicago that neither the French nor German soldiers are equal to our own, and that Remington breech-loaders are better than either the chassépot or needle-gun.

The By-laws of the Grand Lodge of Masons of Illinois, which prohibited colored persons from admission into Masonic lodges in that State, have been repealed.
