Useful Hints, 101 show Borax is the very best cock-roach exterminator yet discovered-a half-pound, costing but 56 cents, has completely cleared a large house, formerly swarming with them, so that the appearance of one in a month is quite a nevelty. The various extirminators puffed and advertised have been found not fully effective, tending rather to make the roaches crazy than to kill them. There is something peculiar either in the smell or the touch

of borax which is certain death to them They will flee in terror from it, and never appear again where it has once been placed. Borax is perfectly harmless to human beings. It is also valuable for laundry purposes. The washerwomen of Holland and Belginm, so proverbially clean, and who get up their linens so beautifully white, use refined borax as washing powder instead of soda, in the proportion of a large handful of borax powder to about ten gallons of boiling water; they save in soap nearly half. All the large washing establishments adopt the same mode. For laces, cambries, e.c., an extra quality of the powder is used; and for crinolines (requiring to be made stiff) a strong solution is necessary. Being a neutral salt, it does not in the slightest degree injure the texture of the linen; its effect is to soften the hardest water, and therefore it should be kept on the toilet table. In cleaning the bair, nothing is better than a solution of borax in water. It leaves the scalp in a cleanly condition; and the hair is just sufficiently stiffened to retain its place. This stiffness, however, can be readily removed, objectionable, by washing with water. Borax is also an excellent dentifrice. Dissolved in water, it is one of the best tooth washes. In hot countries it is used, in combination with tartaric acid and bi-carbonate of soda, as a cooling beverage. - Georgetown Courier.

An Editor's Shirt.

Editors have a first-rate time in Texas. The ladies of a town there have given to the editor of the paper an embroidered shirt which contains a pictorial history of Texas, including the war with Mexico, and the meeting of the first Legislature, and also pictures of the State, all worked in red worsted. Transplanting Evergreens.

There is much said by our cotemporaries as to the proper period for transplanting evergreen trees. As long as we can remember anything, is the question of transplantevergreens; the first tree we ever planted on our own account was a cedar tree. We wanted about a dozen with which to make a hedge, and were told to select the month of August as that was the time of the year to remove them with certainty. We did so, and three years before we could get enough to grow. It is true good-sized trees were selected, but they were not two hours out of the ground before they were in again, and during even that short period the roots were

protected against the sun. We never tried August again. We subsequently planted the hemlock anl Norway spruce, the double spruce, the common mountain spruce, which is frequently sold for the Norway; the white pine, the Excelsior pine; the Driptomeria, the Austrian and Scotch pines, the Irish juniper, the Irish yew, the American, Chinese, and Siberian arbor vitas, and we do not at this time remember that oven one was lost by the transplantation. They were set from the middle of March to the middle of May, and on one occasion the Norway spruce was planted when it had shot full two inches.

August and the autumns months may be very good transplanting times. We merely mention our limited experience, which may not be considered satisfactory; but they cannot be better than the spring when, if properly attended to, all the trees grow .- Germantown Telegraph.

The larger the wheels of a vehicle are, the lighter will be the draft, and besides large wheels produce less friction, because their velocity is less. Small wheels will sink deeper in moist earth than large wheels, but there is no good reason why the hind wheels of a wagon should be higher than the front wheels. By having the hind wheels highest, the inclination forward of the line of traction would press the load into the earth, consequently there would be increased difficulty in drawing it. A wagou with four-inch tire will sink in the ground only about onefourth as deep as two-inch tire. In general, farmers put too much tar and grease in their wagon wheels, which clogs, and makes the wagon run heavy. It is much better to grease every day and keep the spindle of the axle-tree perfectly clean and bright, if even the irons of the axle should wear out sooner and require to be renewed again.

Jamaica Wants to be Aunexed A dispatch from Kingston, dated the 17th, says that since the visit of the San Domingo Commissioners the popular feeling runs high in favor of the United States. There is an idea here that Jamaica will soon follow San Domingo. The feeling of the Haytien refugees, as generally expressed, favors annexation. They say the value of the property in Hayti will increase, and that the Haytiens seeing the railroads, telegraphs, steamers, roads, and the thriving commerce in San Domingo, will soon desire annexation them-

MR. SUMNER ON THE SAN DOMIN-Go JoB -- Mr. Summer delivered an elaborate speech in the Senate, on Monday, against the President's policy for annexing Doninica to this country. He declared that, in this case, "International law had been violated in two of its commanding rules-one securing the equality of nations, and the other providing against belligerent interventionwhile a distinctive fundamental principle of the Constitution by which the President is deprived of asking prerogative is disregarded, and this very kingly prerogative is asserted by the President. Looking still further at the facts we see that ul! this great disobedience has for its object the acquisition of an outlying tropical island with large promises of wealth, and that in carrying out this scheme our republic in power that he might sell his country, and has dealt a blow at the independence of the black Republic of Hayti, which, besides being a wrong to that Republic, was an insult to the African race; and all alone, without the authority of an act of Congress."

Mr. Sumner said, "while they were talking about outrages in the South, it was well to think of those outrages of wnich he had been speaking. While we were talking about the Ku-Klux in the South, we must not forget the costly Ku-Klux which the President had put himself at the head of. Had the President been so inspired as to bestow on southern Unionists, white and black, one-half of the time in zeal, will, personal attention, effort, and personal intercession, which he has bestowed upon his attempt to obtain half an island in the Carribean sea, our Southern Ku Klux would have existed only in name, while tranquility would have reigned everywhere within our borders."

That the President of the United States be fully authorized to employ all the military force of the nation to carry out the provisions of this act."

The report of the commissioners, which is understood to be quite voluminous, will be sent to Congress at once by the President.

Proclamation by President Grant.

Whereas it is prvided in the constitution of the United States that the United States shall protect every State in this Union on application of the Legislature or of the Executive (when the Legislature cannot be convened) against domestic violence: and

Whereas it is provided in the laws of the United States that in all cases of insurrection in any State, or of obstruction to the laws thereof, it shall be lawful for the President of the United States, on application of the Legislature of such State, or of the Executive, (when the Legislature cannot be convened,) to call to be duly executed; and

Whereas I have received inf rmation the State of South Carolina and committing acts of violence in said State of a character and to an extent which renders the powers of the State and its officers unequal to the task of protecting life and property and securing public order therein; and

Whereas the Legislature of said State is not now in session and cannot be convened in time to meet the present emergency, and the Executive of said State has therefore made application to me for such part of the military force of the United States as may be necessary and adequate to protect said State and the citizens thereof against the domestic violence hereinbefore mentioned, and to enforce the due execution of the laws;

Whereas the laws of the United States require that whenever it may be necessary, in the judgment of the President, to use the military force for the purpose aforesaid, he shall forthwith, by proclamation, command such insurgents to disperse and retire peaceably to their respective abodes within a limited time:

Now, therefore. I, Ulysses S. Grant, President af the United States, do hereby command the persons composing the unlawful combinations aforesaid to dis perse and retire peaceably to their respective abodes within twenty days from

The following bill, making important changes in the 134th chapter of the Code, concerning the recovery of the possession of real estate, has been passed by the Legislature: -

Be it enacted; &c. That chapter 134 of the Code of Virginia be amended and re-enacted so as to read as follows:

SEC. 1. If any forcible or unlawful entry be made upon lands, or if, when the entry is unlawful and peaceable, the tenant shall detain the possession of land after his right has expired, without the consent of him who is entitled to the possession, the party so turned out of possession, no matter what right or title he had thereto, or the party against whom such possession is unlawfully detained, may within three years after such forcible or unlawful entry, or such unlawful detainer, sue out of the clerk's office of the circuit, county, or corpora. tion court of the county or corporation in which the land, or some part thereof, may be, a summons against the defendant to answer the complaint of the plaintiff, that the defendant is in presession and un'awfully withholds from the

cedence over all other civil causes on the docket .. SEC. 3. If it appear that the plaintiff was forcibly or unlawfully turned out of

possession or that it was unlawfully detained from him, unless it also appear that the defendant has held or detained the possession for three years before the date of the summons, the verdict or judgment shall be for the plaintiff for the said premises, or such part thereof as may be found to have been so held or detained. When part only of the premises is found for the plaintiff, the verdict or judgment shall describe the part so found. In suc'i cases the verdict or judgment shall be for the plaintiff. If the verdict be for the defendant as to the whole, judgment shall be for him. The summons or other process issued by a-justice of the peace under this chapter may be directed to the sheriff, sergeant,

LEGALITY OF HOLDEN'S IMPEACHMENT. According to the Washington correspondenet of the New York Tribune, Governor Holden claims that the two-thirds vote of the North Carolina Senate by which he was im. peached was not a legal one, and it is thought probable that the case will go before the United States Supreme Court.— He also claims that seven of the Senators who voted for his impeachment were disqualified under the fourteenth amendment to the constitution of the U. States. In this connection it is interesting to learn that the Virginia Senate has passed a joint resolution expressing the opinion that any person who is entitled to vote under the constitution is eligable to a seat in either house of the General Assembly such position not besng an office within the meaning of the fourteenth amendment to the constitution of the United States. Conviction of the Governor of North

The following dispatch gives the conclusion of the impeachment trial of Governor Holden, of North Carolina, and his conviction, as sent to the New York

RALEIGH, March 22 .- The impeachment trial of Governor Holden closed today, on the forty fifth day, resulting in his conviction on the six last articles by a mixed vote of both political parties -The ceremony of taking the vote was very impressive and somewhat exciting, and the deepest interest was manifested in the case by the throng of spectators in the galleries and lobbies. At eleven A. M Mr. Chief Justice Pearson took the chair as presiding officer of the Court .-Soon afterwards the managers, their counsel and the members of the House of Representatives marched into the Senate Chamber in the order named and took their seats that were assigned to them. The galleries on the front and left of the Chief Justice were filled with a brilliant array of beauty and elite of Raleigh. At the call of the roll fortynine of the Senators answered to their names -- one member only, a republican, being absent, making them stand politically thirty-six conservatives to thirteen republicans. Due notice was then given that if any demonstration was made upon the announcement of a vote in the galleries or lobbics that the chamber would be cleared of all but the members of the House of Representatives. The chief justice commanded the doorkeener to maintain strict order and keep silence. The Chief Justice,-The olerk will read the first of the articles of impeach-

The clerk then read, amid a profound silence, the first article, which charges the respondent with raising unlawful armed bodies of troops, and causelessly declaring the county of Alamance in a state of insurrection, and afterwards unlawfully arresting Lucien H. Murray and 81 other citizens of Alamance, and unlawfully detaining them, when there was no insurrection, and when the civil officers of the law were in the full exercise of all their functions. The clerk then called Senator Adams. whereupon the Senator arose in his seat.

The Chief Justice. - Senator Adams, how say you, is William W. Holden guilty or not guilty, as charged in the article of impeachment?

Senator Adams .- Guilty. The question was propounded to each Senator in the manner above stated, on each article of impeachment, the Senator answering "guilty" or "not guilty." On the first the vote was Guilty, 30; not guilty, 19, which lacked three of the required two-thirds to convict, six conservatives voting for acquittal

Article 2. The same as toC aswell, arresting John Kerr and seventeen other citizens of that county. Upon this the votegwas-guilty, 32; not guilty 17, and the respondent was acquitted.

Article 3, Unlawfully arresting, in the county of Orange, Josiah Turner Jr. and imprisoning him. Guilty, 37; not guilty, 12; which convicted the respondent, two republicans voting for conviction and one conservative for acquittal. When the chief justice made the announcement of this vote there was a loud and suppressed hum and smiles of ap proval from the ladies in the galleries, with a general whisper of congratulation from one to the other.

Article 4. Unlawfully arresting and detaining in the county of Caswell, John Kerr and three other citizens. Guilty, 33; not guilty, 16; which being a concurrence of two-thirds, the respondent was convicted, three conservatives voting not guilty.

Article 5. Refusing to obey the writ of the habeas corpus in the case of Adolphus G. Moor. Guilty 40; not guilty, 9 four of the republicans-Messers Lehman, Moore, McCotter, and Hawkins voting for conviction. This was regarded as the strongest of the articles, involving as it did, the great principles of civil liberty. The vote met with a general expression of approval, and would have been applauded but for the strict decorum observed in the court.

Article 6, For refusing to obey the writ of the habeas corpus in the case of John Kerr and eighteen other citizens of Caswell county. Guilty, forty-one; not guilty, eight; five republicans voting

for conviction.

Article 7. For unlawfully recruiting a large body of troops from this State and the State of Tennessee; and placing in command of them Kirk and other desperadoes from the State of Tennessee: for unlawfully arresting and imprisoning John Kerr and many others; for hanging by the neck William Patton, Lucien H. Murray and others ; for thrusting in a loathsome dungeon Josiah Turner, Jr., and F. A. Wiley, and without lawful authority; for making his warrant upon David A Jenkins, treasurer of the State, for seventy' thousand dollars or more to pay his said unlawful troops. Guilty, thirty-six; not guilty, thirteen; one conservative voting for acquittal and one republican voting for conviction.

Article 8. For inciting and procuring the said State treasurer to disregard the injunction to restrain him from paying the sum of eighty thousand dollars or more out of the public treasury for the unlawful purpose of paying his said unlawful troops. Guilty, thirty-six; not guilty, thirteen-A strict party vote and the only one cast on the articles of im

peachment. This made six upon which the respondent was convicted, and Mr. Manager Sparrow moved that the Senate proceed in the name of the people of North Carolina, to pass judgment apon William W

Mr. Graham then offered an order that William W. Holden be deposed from office, and that he be forever after disqualified from holding any place of emolument or trust in the State this the yeas and nays were called - yeas 36, nays 13. The order was adopted, and upon being certified to and copies lodged with the chief justice and secreta-

ry of State, it was in effect. The trial lasted forty five days. Entire cost, including reporting, printing, and all the witnesses, about \$6,060, and the report covers over 300 octavo pages.

The result was as generally anticipated and was hailed as the harbinger of peace and quiet in the State.


