Editorial Board Nabbed In City Crime Crackdown

Eight Madison College students were apprehended last night in a city-wide crackdown on crime. The arrests have uncovered the largest crime syndicate ever in Harrisonburg history.

At approximately 10:52 city police poured into THE BREEZE office in the Warren Campus Center of Madison College and arrested the eight member Editorial Board of the paper. Official police sources admitted to having received information from a "concerned citizen", but refused to reveal the source.

Apparently, the Harrisonburg eight have been using the newspaper as a cover-up for the headquarters of a large syndicate which is rumored to extend into all areas of Rockingham County. Included in the possible charges are gambling, prostitution, loan rackets, all forms of drugs, moonshine, and some sources have even gone so far as to add Communist affiliation.

egory Byrne, Cynthia Carney, Andy Fields, John Hulver, Charles Lockard, Mari Rechin, Linda Shaut, and Jeanne Weber. Official charges have not been brought but Harrisonburg City Police Chief Julius Ritchie commented, "We have enough evidence to put these damn perverts behind bars for life."

Immediate evidence was available as the police broke into the office. Illegal alcohol was clearly present and all eight were engaged in a gambling game.

Chief Ritchie said that the first evidence turned up about a month ago and an intensive investigation has been in progress since.

According to the official records of the group confiscated during the bust, the newspaper has been a coverup for the activities for over a year and a half. The records gave complete details as to all the illegal activities that have been in progress. More arrests are expected.

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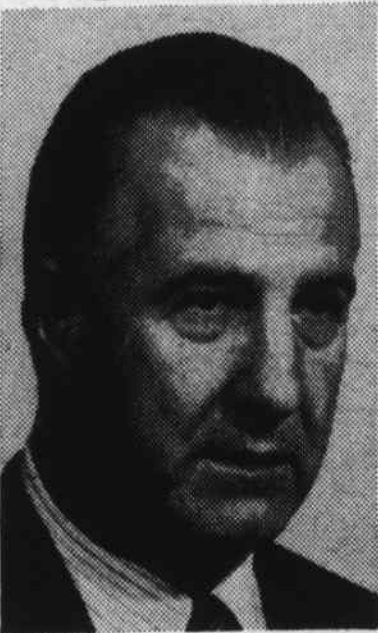
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Joins Poli Sci Department

The high jump was easily won by the girls who placed 1-2-3 in the event since none of the males wanted to risk competing in the event.

The obstacle course was exactly like the course run during the Superstars competition recently seen on television. For those of you who don't know, the obstacle course consists of climbing a ten foot wall, moving a football blocking sled, maneuvering 20 old tires, and jumping over a water hazard, high jump, and two hurdles.

This event proved to be the most difficult for many of the contestants especially the ten foot wall. "Oh yeah, that wall was pretty tough," complained Jacque Kass who ran for the Blue Streaks. "I made it over O.K., but couldn't finish the course. It took ten minutes just to remove the splinters from my (censored)!"

feminist action groups in the area.

When contacted, Vance Jenkins, Sports Editor of "The Breeze" termed the condition of the kidnappers as "outrageous." He said that, "The Breeze will be more than happy to pay up to \$4,000,000 ransom out of petty cash, but devoting two pages of the paper to women's sports is unthinkable and completely impossible." He added however that, "I will do everything in my power to assist in the safe return of Chuck Lockard."

Official sources have disagreed over the area in which they feel that the traces of the kidnapping have led. W.W. Wilberger, head of Security, released a statement after members of his force discovered a trail of blood leading to Godwin Hall. In this statement he said "I feel that all evidence leads to the conclusion that the hostage is being held in one of the rooms in Godwin. Every member of my Security staff will assist me in a complete search of this building until this hostage is found." It is estimated that the search will only take two weeks.

However, Gene Wagner, Director of the Physical Plant, disagreed and stated that he felt the kidnappers had disposed of

the body in Newman Lake. "After members of the Astro-Turf crew found several copies of last week's "Breeze" in the lake, I can come to no other conclusion than that Lockard has been disposed in the lake. There's no doubt in my mind that there is no hope to find him unharmed," he said. In releasing this statement, Wagner called on President Carrier to declare Madison College a disaster area and to call in the National Guard to drag the lake in search of the body.

Holding a press conference this morning, Lockard's parents issued an appeal to the kidnappers concerning the safe return of their son. The statement reads: "We don't know what you want and we don't know why you are doing this, but we'll double whatever you are asking so long as you promise to hold Chuck for at least two years so that we'll have plenty of time to move our family to some other city."

Shortage Over

President Nixon announced today that the crippling banana shortage, caused by the recent war with Columbia, Bolivia, and Ecuador, has ceased to be a crisis. The President cited recent successful negotiations with the South American countries as the reason for now calling the shortage a "problem" instead of a crisis.

In the same statement, the President declared that the lengthy lines outside Safeway and other grocery stores would be greatly reduced by this May.
