



Gorby quits Communism; party withers

The transformation of the Soviet Union and the collapse of the Communist Party continued Saturday as Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev resigned as Communist Party General Secretary.

Gorbachev also called on the Communist Party to dissolve itself, ending nearly 75 years of Communist rule in the Soviet Union. And the Soviet government seized all party property and assets.



These were the latest in a string of events signaling the decentralization of power in the Soviet Union after the unsuccessful coup by Communist hard-liners to force Gorbachev from the government.

Soviets are still cautiously celebrating. But future unrest, an unstable economy and a fragmented, leaderless military have the Soviets — and the rest of the world — worried.

"There is still a very potentially dangerous situation existing in the Soviet Union," said Dr. J. Barkley Rosser, a JMU economics professor. "There could even be an outbreak of war due to numerous border disputes between the Russian republics."

Dr. Mary Louise Loe, a JMU history professor, said the Soviet response to the coup was a great victory for democracy, but its effects are not as direct as most believe. "While it was the first real test for the Russian people, these latest events won't have much of an immediate effect on the Soviet Union, especially with respect to its economy," she said.

Both Loe and Rosser believe that Russian Federation President Boris Yeltsin's aggressive conduct during the coup attempt has greatly weakened Gorbachev. "Yeltsin has definitely emerged as the strongman, while Gorbachev has quickly become a symbolic figure," Loe said.

"Gorbachev was weakened by the fact that he had personally appointed many of the coup committee members," she said.

"Gorbachev has been swept along by these events and has had to go along with Yeltsin to maintain his sort of figurehead power," Rosser said.

"Yeltsin has come out as the man in charge. He has basically overruled Gorbachev's choices to head the new party," he said, referring to Gorbachev's decision to demand the resignation of the entire Soviet government Friday and fire numerous cabinet ministers he had appointed only a day before.

Rosser added that there will be a popular election for Soviet President in about a year and Gorbachev will most likely lose.

Meanwhile, the governments of the Soviet republics are becoming increasingly restless, and many republics have declared independence. One of

these is the Ukraine, which claimed control of the 1.5 million troops in its territory Saturday.

"There have been at least seven republics which have already declared or are about to declare their independence," Rosser said. "There exists a serious situation where it is unclear as to who controls the military and the nuclear weapons. This is making the republics nervous," he said.

Loe added that she envisions in the near future a treaty that will quell the republics' restlessness. "It is even possible that a treaty stronger than the currently proposed Union Treaty will be put forth that will give even more independence to the republics," she said.

Rosser said the restructuring of the Soviet government won't immediately stabilize the Soviet economy. "The economic transformation will be very difficult," he said. "In the short run the economy will be even more destabilized. There will be an inevitable

period of economic instability."

The Soviet government's long-term goal of stabilizing the economy includes privatization of property and making Russian currency internationally convertible, Rosser said. However, he added, the introduction of a market economy will mean that many production facilities won't survive, causing a large increase in unemployment.

Rosser said he believes the United States needs to become more vigorously involved in the economic recovery of the Soviet Union. "President Bush has been criticized by the Allies for being insufficiently forthcoming in the area of economic aid," he said. "Part of the reason for the coup was Gorbachev's inability to [get] any substantial economic aid from the G-Seven at last month's economic summit.

"The U.S. should be prepared to spend some bucks," he said.

Days of upheaval: A timeline of Soviet change

A chronology of the key events of the past week in the Soviet Union:

Monday, August 19:

- Gorbachev ousted in coup backed by Communist hard-liners. Soviet Vice President Gennady Yanayev takes power.
- Russian Federation President calls on Russians to resist takeover.
- Hundreds of tanks and military vehicles move into Moscow.
- Many press outlets censored or shut down.

Tuesday, August 20:

- Three leaders of the eight-man coup committee step down.
- Coup leaders impose a curfew in Moscow Tuesday night.
- The United States, Japan and the European community suspend economic aid to the Soviet Union.

Wednesday, August 21:

- Coup committee flees Moscow by plane and head to the Soviet Central Asian Republic of Kirgizia.
- Tanks pull out of Moscow.
- Soviet legislature nullifies coup leaders' emergency decrees.
- Restrictions on press are lifted.
- Gorbachev heads back to Moscow to resume power.



Thursday, August 22:

- Gorbachev continues to stand by Communist Party, saying it still could contribute to reform.
- Boris Pugo, Interior Minister and a coup leader, commits suicide as officials come to arrest him.

Friday, August 23:

- Gorbachev demands the resignation of the entire government.
- Yeltsin suspends activities of the Russian faction of the Communist Party.
- Two Baltic states outlaw the Communist Party.
- Soviet governments begin to seize Communist Party buildings and assets.
- Yeltsin claims Russian ownership of the core of the Communist Party press.

Saturday, August 24:

- Gorbachev resigns as Communist Party General Secretary and calls on the party's central committee to dissolve itself.
- The Ukraine parliament declares its independence and claims control of the 1.5 million troops in its territory.

Sunday, August 25:

- Gorbachev's principle military adviser, Sergei Akromyev, originally thought to have opposed the coup, commits suicide.

Former prof files sex bias suit against JMU

A former assistant professor of philosophy filed a sex discrimination suit against JMU June 27.

Dr. Mary J. Robinette claimed JMU violated the 1964 Civil Rights Act because her application for a tenure-track position received "unfair treatment" from a selection committee in the Department of Philosophy and Religion.

Robinette also claimed in the suit that JMU violated the Equal Pay Act, underpaying her because of her gender. She is asking to return to her job at JMU with back pay.

Robinette claims senior members of the department passed her over in the selection process in retaliation for her "prior claims of sex discrimination in employment by the philosophy department," according to the suit.

Fred Hilton, director of communications for the president's office, said the suit "has no merit," but would not comment further as the suit is still in progress.

Student dies in June diving accident

A JMU student died June 9 of injuries suffered in a diving accident June 5.

Larkin Margaret Smith, 21, a junior English major from Falls Church, suffered a broken neck and fractured skull after she dove off a 14-foot rock and plunged headfirst into a submerged rock at Panther Falls in George Washington National Forest. She died at 1:55 a.m. June 9 at the University of Virginia Medical Center in Charlottesville.

Smith was swimming with a group of JMU students when the accident occurred near Buena Vista, Va.

Smith was active in various environmental groups, including EARTH and Catalyst. She also was a member of the Skyline Literacy Coalition.

A memorial rock garden was established in JMU's Arboretum this summer in Smith's honor.

Henderson sentenced to three life terms

Ronald Lee Henderson was sentenced June 17 to three consecutive life terms for the robbery, abduction and murder of JMU sophomore Leann Whitlock in January 1990.

In sentencing Henderson, Staunton Circuit Court Judge Rudolph Bumgardner III denied

Henderson's request that the life terms be served concurrently. Bumgardner's sentencing is instead three times what Henderson wanted, following the recommendation of the Winchester Circuit Court jury who convicted Henderson March 27.

The sentencing will make him eligible for parole in about 17 years.

Although charged with capital murder, Henderson, 25, was convicted of the lesser charge of first degree murder, which does not carry the death penalty.

Benson new dean of education and psych

JMU has a new dean of the College of Education and Psychology — Dr. Jerry Benson, replacing Dr. Jean Ramage, who has taken a position as dean of the College of Education at the University of California at San Bernadino.

"Education is all the university's responsibility," Benson said, adding that his main task as dean will be to deal with the new governing structure in the college of education.

He said the programs in the college are "exciting, innovative and applicable to the future."

"This is a very service-oriented college," Benson said. "We have a great challenge in keeping programs oriented to the 21st century."

Benson is not a new face at JMU. He is an associate professor of psychology, and since 1980 he has been the director of the Human Development Center and Shenandoah Child Development Clinic, an interdisciplinary training facility located in the Education Building.

Dr. Bethany Oberst, JMU's new vice president of academic affairs, headed the selection of Benson. "I was very impressed with him," Oberst said, complimenting his leadership abilities and familiarity with the new reaccreditation process within the college.

Oberst named new vp for academic affairs

Dr. Bethany Oberst was named vice president for academic affairs at JMU Aug. 15.


Oberst came to JMU from Southwest Missouri State University in Springfield, Mo., where she served as the dean of the College of Arts and Letters for two years.

She accepted the position because she was impressed with JMU's goals and considers the faculty and students outstanding, she said.

"As soon as I get further acquainted with the faculty and students ... [we'll] build on strengths already at the university," she said.

Her main interest is in international programs, Oberst said. She wants students to have the opportunity to live in different countries and is pleased with the studies abroad programs already established at JMU.

"She is a woman who is sensitive to faculty concerns," Joanne Gabbin, director of the honors program, said. "She's committed to the kind of vision that JMU has for the future."



Henderson admitted to the abduction and robbery of Whitlock during the March trial but denied that he had any part in her actual death.

Henderson was arrested July 10 in Baker City, Oregon and extradited to Virginia in October.

Tommy David Strickler, 25, was convicted in June 1990 of robbery, abduction and capital murder in connection with Whitlock's death.

Strickler was sentenced to death, and the Virginia Supreme Court denied his appeal. But Strickler has just begun an appeals process which could take eight to ten years.

Whitlock, 19, of Roanoke, was abducted on January 5, 1990 from Valley Mall in Harrisonburg. Her body was found eight days later in a wooded area about five miles north of Waynesboro.

Bullpen fills entertainment void

It's early evening on Saturday. Whatever it is you've been studying, has turned your brain to mush.

There's really nothing going on for a few hours.

And D-hall is serving chicken for dinner.

Again.

So what's a JMU student to do?

Up until this summer, the entertainment options included bowling, going to the movies or going to the mall.

But now, a new form of entertainment has come to Harrisonburg with the opening of The Bullpen behind Valley Mall.

The Bullpen is complete with an 18-hole miniature golf course and a batting cage with seven pitching machines.

Luther Mitchell of Keezletown manages and is part-owner of The Bullpen, which was made possible by the formation of a corporation made up of local investors.

And though The Bullpen has been open only a month, Mitchell declares the venture a success.


"It's something Harrisonburg really needed," he said. "Business has been very good so far, due in part to the nice weather. We're very pleased, and people in the area are excited about this because it's something totally new to Harrisonburg."

The Bullpen originally was the idea of 1971 JMU graduate, Mike Mott, who now is The Bullpen's assistant manager and a part-owner.

Mott brought the idea to Mitchell, and they began their research by going to batting cages in Hampton, Baltimore and New York.

"Things really snowballed when we decided to enlarge to go with the miniature golf course," Mitchell said.

Now, The Bullpen sits on more than

two acres of land and also includes a building housing a snack bar and a video arcade.

And Mitchell said The Bullpen is already looking into ways to expand the business, and other entertainment options are being explored.

Mitchell said The Bullpen also is interested in forming some softball and baseball teams and leagues, and anyone interested can contact him at The Bullpen.

The Bullpen is family entertainment, but is also geared toward college students, Mitchell said.

"JMU students were a big factor in deciding to do this," Mitchell said. "Also, with Bridgewater and EMC, there are a lot of students here."

"We felt that even with the local support, those people coming in from out of town would really boost business. A lot of students from out of town are already exposed to this in other areas."

"We think students will be surprised when they come back and see us here."

Mitchell's wife, Chris, also works at The Bullpen, and is optimistic about the future.

"When I came to Harrisonburg from New York 18 years ago, there was not much to do here," she said. "And it

seems the only thing that hasn't come to Harrisonburg is entertainment.

"This is a place where parents can come and leave their kids for an hour and feel safe leaving them. We're a real family-oriented place."

Because of the crowd attracted by The Bullpen, there is no alcohol allowed on the premises, and the

owners encourage patrons to help keep the facilities in good condition.

The Bullpen is open 10 a.m. to 11 p.m. Monday through Saturday and 1 p.m. to 11 p.m. on Sunday.

Times will change due to seasons and weather, but Mitchell said The Bullpen will be open year-round because of the video arcade and the snack bar.

Tokens for the batting cage can be purchased from Bullpen employees. One token can be bought for \$1 and buys 18 pitches.

There are also volume discounts for the batting cages — six tokens for \$5 or 13 tokens for \$10.

Batters can select slow, fast or very fast pitches and can choose either baseballs or softballs. The pitching machines throw strikes and balls intermittently throughout the 18 pitches.

Prices for golf vary. Day rates — 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Thursday — are \$2.50 for people age 13 and over and \$1.50 for children ages 6 through 12. Children 5 and under play for free.

Fees for the remaining times are \$3 for adults and \$2 for children.

The Bullpen has special golf rates for groups and birthday parties.

Soviets hold fast for future

The *coup d'etat* failed. The self-appointed committee of Communist leaders fell within days of attempting to reclaim a struggling Soviet nation and grip its people with the rusted hand of iron rule.

After 72 hours of house arrest, Mikhail Gorbachev returned humbled, but unharmed, to his post as U.S.S.R. president. What awaited him was not only the exposed betrayal of almost his entire principal government, but the veritable snap of a line between people and politics he'd been straddling for months.

Now the world rejoices over Gorbachev's return, but the crucial factor is not the return or success of a single man, but the return and success of the long-oppressed Soviet people. In the streets of Moscow, Leningrad, Kiev — everywhere, the people not only spoke — they screamed, while climbing atop armored vehicles to defy the military takeover.

JMU's unanswered request

How was everybody's summer? Good. Now let's dispense with the formalities and pick up a subject that was poorly handled at the end of last semester.

The students of JMU and President Carrier are the two most important driving forces of this institution. However, it came to everyone's attention during last year's proverbial "Carrier Bashing" session that the relationship between this university's president and its students was not as intact as would seem on the surface.

The semester's end temporarily concluded the ordeal and the administration informed students who signed the circulating petitions that they would be contacted by Carrier over the summer. The goal of the petition was to demand a question and answer forum between Carrier and those students concerned with the course of JMU. Carrier's failure to

Unfortunately, western media mistakenly places the country's future in the hands of displaced politicians. Though allies, Yeltsin and Gorbachev continue their power struggle; government appointments and removals dominate headlines. Experts and specialists seep from the woodwork to criticize, analyze and systemize; but the real power lies in the hands of those whose future they debate.

What stands before these people is the proposition of an entirely new order of civilization. Upcoming is an era of still more sacrifice for the already-struggling average citizen. The transition to a democratic, free market society means closing factories, losing jobs and waiting even longer for food and goods. The future belongs not to politicians, but to those who must survive the changes necessary to secure it.

acknowledge the symbolic force of this petition totally undermined the communicative effort trying to be established. On the student side of things, the protests were viewed by some as excessive. But one significant impact did emerge from the protests and this was the fact that the students were serious and not to be taken lightly.

Despite all the events of last semester, the protesting students' sole request for an open forum has yet to be answered. Perhaps a new year will shine light on the situation and provide the administration with more time to entertain the questions and concerns of JMU's present student population. If not, it will be a shame to think of what a bad first impression the entering class of 1995 will have on the university that is supposed to be their home for the next four years.


Madison Mayhem


New student guide offers helpful hints

Scherer preparing Dukes for 1st test

Since the departure of former JMU head football coach Joe Purzycki last December, the winds of change have been blowing through Bridgeforth Stadium.

Rip Scherer, Purzycki's replacement, has instituted a new offense while attempting to instill a new attitude in his players.

A period of change is usually accompanied by an equally large number of question marks, and Scherer has had plenty to deal with. The first question was settled last week.

JMU's annual quarterback controversy came to at least a temporary halt when Scherer announced that the incumbent, junior Eriq Williams, would get the nod over up and coming junior John Gaylord. The more experienced Williams will lead the Dukes against a very strong Virginia Tech team next Saturday night in Blacksburg.

Gaylord, who has a stronger arm than Williams, became a contender for

the job in spring practice. But Williams' preparation in the off-season and his performance in camp has kept him in the number-one position.

"John's been making a lot of progress and he's come a long way," Scherer said. "But Eriq has done it before and by the same token he's performed very well and I fully expect him to have a good year as a quarterback."


Scherer has said he would like to give Gaylord some game experience and will most likely use him at one point in the Tech game.

For now though, the ball rests in Williams' hands. The 5-foot-10, 165-pounder has always been a running threat, but his efficiency as a passer remains a question.

Senior Tom Green, who saw shared time with Williams last season at QB, moved to tailback during spring practice and is currently battling junior Kenny Sims for the number-one spot there.

Academics sideline 3 basketball recruits

Three of JMU basketball coach Lefty Driesell's freshman recruits failed to meet minimum NCAA academic guidelines and will not enroll this fall.

Avis Willis, a 6-foot point guard from West Potomac, Kareem Robinson, a 6-foot-8 forward from Stratford, Conn.; and Luther Bates, a 6-6 forward from Palmyra, all failed to meet NCAA Proposition 48 minimum standards and were not offered admission to the university, according to JMU Athletic Director Dean Ehlers.

Ehlers said JMU has never admitted a male athlete to the university that did not meet Proposition 48 guidelines of a minimum score of 700 on the SAT and a 2.0 cumulative high school grade point average.

"Each student-athlete knows what is expected when they sign a grant-in-aid. The first two things that are on the

grant is that they have to meet JMU standards and they have to meet NCAA standards for it to be effective," Ehlers said. "We didn't accept them. We have never done that for a male athlete and the practice is that if they do not meet minimum NCAA standards we do not take them."

According to Driesell, both Robinson and Bates will attend prep schools and Willis has elected to attend a junior college. Driesell would not comment on the player's academic status, saying, "I think it's against a student's personal rights to discuss grades."

Driesell did say that he expects all three to reapply to JMU next fall and

is confident that they will all someday play for the Dukes.

"They are released from their national letter of intent, but they told us they are definitely coming here," he said.

Driesell defended Bates and Robinson's decision to attend prep schools, adding that he encouraged the two to put off their college career for a year.

"I just wanted them to go to prep school," he said. "A lot of people go to prep school. (JMU sophomore forward) Clayton Ritter went to prep school, Pete Maravich went to prep school. Just because a guy goes to prep school doesn't mean he's Proposition 48."

Driesell, who has seen over 90 percent of the players who have played for him graduate, said he has no regrets about recruiting any of the three.

"I recruited a kid at Maryland that had a four-something on his SAT's and he graduated," he said. "It's an

individual thing. You have to judge what his attitude is and how bad he wants it. I've always said that 'I will' is more important than 'IQ.'"

Ehlers said JMU sets no academic minimums for student-athletes and candidates for scholarships are judged on a case-by-case basis.

Of Willis, Robinson and Bates, Ehlers said, "When they were offered an application for a grant-in-aid, the coaches probably believed that they would make the NCAA minimum," Ehlers said. "They signed early, back in November, so they still had a full school year ahead of them and some of them had not even taken those exams."

Ehlers said although he does have some problems with Proposition 48, he agrees that minimum standards must be set.

"The individual is the important thing," he said. "You have to look at a lot of things, not just the board scores, but there is a minimum and I agree

Driesell calls Dukes' schedule 'best ever'

UNLV visits the Convo Dec. 5th; Dukes to play 8 NCAA tournament teams

While "On the Road Again" may well have been the JMU men's basketball team's theme song last season, the Dukes will be singing a different tune come early winter.

That's because this season's schedule is dominated by home games, a stark contrast to the one that racked up frequent flyer miles a year ago. The 1991-92 setup gives JMU students and fans plenty of opportunities to catch the team at the Convocation Center.

The Dukes will open the season Nov. 20 at Georgia Tech in a first-round game of the talent-laden preseason NIT to be televised by ESPN. A victory would ensure a matchup against another high-caliber squad and more potential national coverage.

Following the tournament, head coach Lefty Driesell has lined up six consecutive home games highlighted by a Dec. 5 matchup with national runner-up Nevada-Las Vegas. The game originally was to be played at the Capital Centre, but Driesell said UNLV head coach Jerry Tarkanian "did him a favor" by allowing the game to be played at the Convocation Center.

Aside from UNLV, JMU will take on four other teams that appeared in last year's NCAA tournament at the Convocation Center and three others on the road.

The Dukes will host Brigham Young (Dec. 7), South Alabama (Dec. 14), Penn State (Jan. 7) and Richmond (Feb. 29). BYU won the Western Athletic Conference crown; South Alabama was the Sun Belt Conference winner; and Richmond won the

Colonial Athletic Association Tournament.

Driesell, beginning his fourth year at JMU, said this is the best schedule he has been able to assemble.

"I'm very excited about our schedule and I think the students ought to be elated," he said. The schedule is "probably too great for the experience our players will have, but I like to play good teams and I've said that all along."

Driesell returns only one starter — Jeff Chambers — from last year's team that went 19-9 and captured the CAA regular season title for the second straight year. Gone is two-time CAA Player of the Year Steve Hood and teammates that accounted for over 85 percent of the team's scoring a year ago.

But with a talented crop of new faces highlighted by transfers Bryan Edwards and Michael Venson, Driesell has no regrets about the schedule.

"I'm not worried about it," he said. "You're not going to improve if you don't play good teams. If I played the same schedule that we played the first year I came here, we'd win 25 games next year, but I don't think the players would improve as much and I don't think it would be as much of a challenge."

In addition to road games with its CAA opponents and Georgia Tech, JMU will travel to East Tennessee State (Dec. 23), Oregon State (Jan. 3), Auburn (Feb. 12) and George Washington (Feb. 17). The matchup at George Washington will be televised by ESPN.

In all, the Dukes play 14 home games, 12 away and two at neutral sites.

with that because I think it makes high school kids work harder."

Ehlers said JMU women's basketball forward Brandy Cruthird is the only athlete JMU has made an exception for regarding Proposition 48.

Women's basketball head coach Shelia Moorman said Cruthird's work ethic and attitude were key in giving the Dorchester, Mass. native a chance to succeed in the college environment. Cruthird has done so — she carries a C-plus grade point average and should graduate with her class in May, Moorman said.

Even with the loss of Willis, Bates, and Robinson, seven new faces will join the defending regular season Colonial Athletic Association Dukes for the 1991-92 campaign.

Michael Venson, a 6-7 forward, and

Bryan Edwards, a 6-1 guard, will finally get a chance to step on the court after sitting out last season in accordance with NCAA transfer guidelines. They will be joined by junior college transfers Paul Carter and Gerry Lancaster, both 6-foot-7 forwards.

Freshmen that will join the team include Kent Culucko, a 6-4 sharpshooting guard from Mahwah, N.J., and Vladimir Cuk, a 6-11 Yugoslavian center whom Driesell considers a project.

Rounding out the list of newcomers is Keith Peoples, a freshman Driesell was able to sign after learning Willis would not be available. Peoples is a 6-1 point guard from Spencer, Oklahoma that JMU assistant coach Chuck Driesell spotted at an AAU tournament in Arkansas.

Dukes Sports Highlights

Volleyball, field hockey name new coaches

Football coach Rip Scherer is not the only new coach in town. Both the women's volleyball and field hockey teams will be headed by different people this year.

JMU named Christy Morgan as head field hockey coach this summer. Morgan comes to JMU from the University of Maryland where she had been the assistant field hockey coach since 1988 and head coach since January. Maryland posted a 33-22-5 record over the last three seasons and played in two NCAA tournaments (1988, 1990).

After losing coach Catherine Milligan to Cal Poly-San Luis

Obispo in March, the volleyball team finally has a replacement. JMU named Mary Harrington, the volleyball coach at Rider University for the past four years, to the head coaching position this summer.

Soccer team elects 1991 captains

Mike Hauschild and Brian Albrecht have been elected co-captains of the 1991 JMU men's soccer team.

Hauschild, a senior defender, is a three-year starter, and was voted the Dukes co-defensive most valuable player last year. Albrecht, a junior and a two-year letterman, is a starter at midfield.

resolved, the question is who will protect the passer. The Dukes return just two of their starting offensive linemen from last year's squad and the front line is one of the team's biggest question marks. Offensive tackle Chris Thurman and center Doug Murphy are back as the most experienced members of the offensive line. The Dukes are looking for juniors Brian Kagle and Derek Spangler, both reserves a year ago, to fill out the front four.

Despite the lack of game experience, Scherer foresees good results from this group.

"I like their heart. I think they're a bunch of guys who are tired of being maligned and being pointed out as the weakness or the liability on this team," he said. "I think they'll fight their guts out."

Let's try the I

Another JMU tradition continues this season with the institution of a new offense. Scherer, a former offensive coordinator, has brought the I-Formation scheme from Arizona to the Burg. In the past three seasons, Purzycki experimented with the winged-T, the multi-T and the multi-bone offenses, none of which resulted in multi-wins.

According to Scherer, patience is the key to installing a new offense.

"I think it takes a whole year for a

guy to be in a new system and understand what an offense is all about, and I think we're making progress. They've done everything we've asked of them," he said.

JMU has had a dominating rushing game over the past few years, but its aerial attack has been anything but spectacular. Last year the Dukes piled up an average of 255 yards per game on the ground, but only 124 yards through the air. Scherer is looking to balance out the offense with a more consistent passing game, but makes no guarantees.

"In terms of the passing game I really didn't know what to expect. I was hoping that it would work out the way it has. We can be a solid passing team and throw the ball a lot of different ways and Eriq has responded to that," Scherer said.

The Scherer system

The players have also had to deal with a change in coaching philosophy. Purzycki's laid back style has taken a back seat to Scherer's more hard nosed approach.

Despite early problems with some players, Scherer's "tight ship" mentality has established a sense of team unity.

"Our team needed a little more discipline," admitted linebacker Shannon Vissman. "At first some

people rebelled, but then everyone conformed and it's brought everyone closer. The team has really taken on to that."

Hoedown with the Hokies

It will most likely take an incredible amount of team unity for the Dukes to overcome Virginia Tech this weekend. The Hokies are the only I-A team on JMU's schedule this season, replacing Navy, a team the Dukes beat twice in the last two years.

Tech has been ranked in many preseason polls and provides the Dukes with a classic David and Goliath confrontation.

"It gave our guys something to focus on all summer as opposed to just any other team on the schedule," Scherer said. "The fact that it's a I-A team and an in-state rival may have had a fix; however, you want guys to gear it up a notch in terms of off-season preparation."

The odds against constant success against formidable I-A opponents are slim right now, but Scherer feels playing these teams is very beneficial for the advancement of the program.

"I want to play at least one I-A team a year and we're talking about playing two in a couple years. Hopefully as our program progresses we'll be able to be competitive on a week to week basis with those teams."







Today, in our continuing series on How Guys Think, we address the painful issue of: Why Guys Won't Make Commitments.


