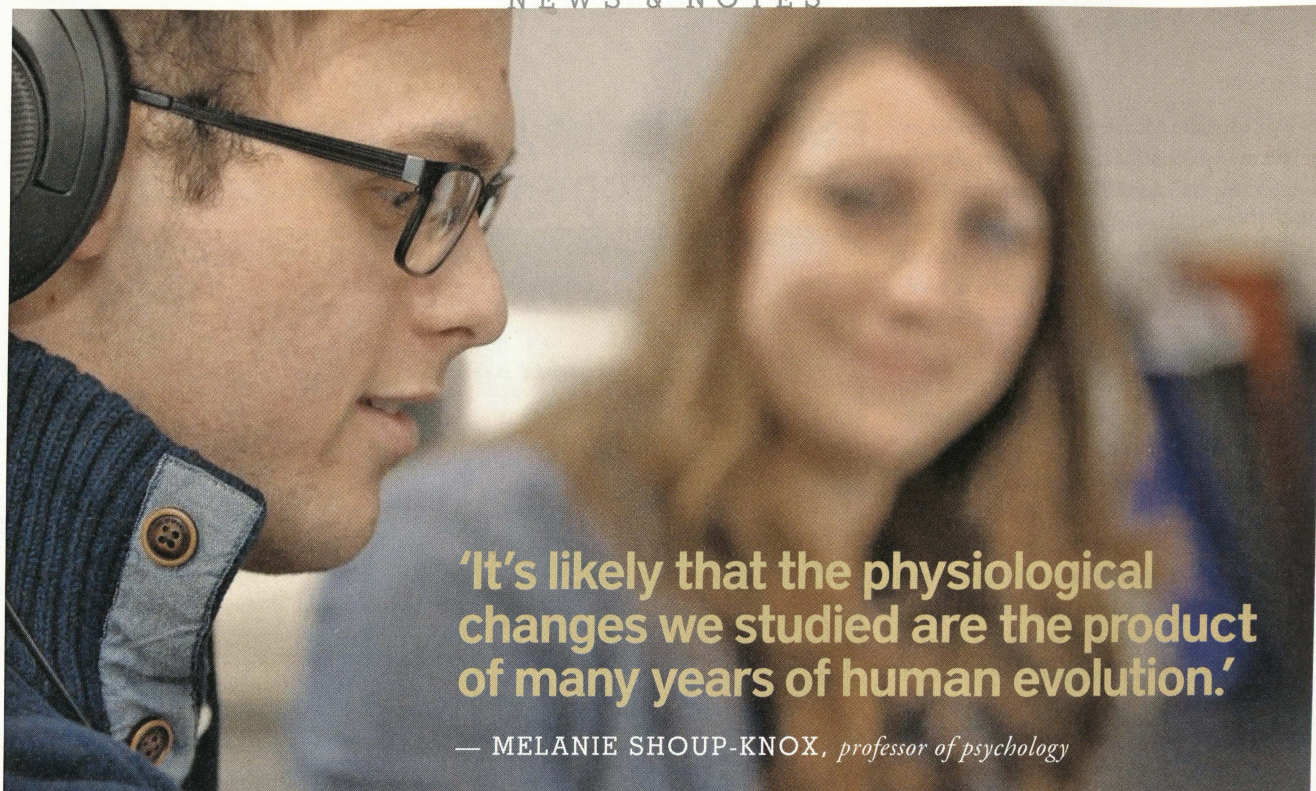

Psychology professor studies the power of the female voice

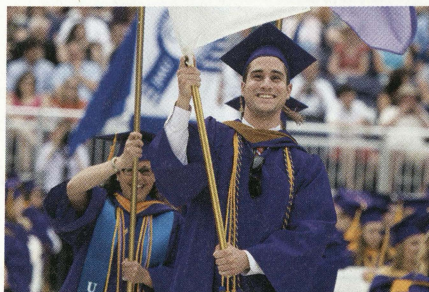
